Mount Coote had been founded by Sir Gilbert Greenall at the beginning of the century and since Alan took over the stud has bred a number of really good horse including the 1000 Guineas winner. One in A Million, the present champion National Hunt sire Deep Run, Ballymacad and Ragtime.

Mount Coote is a commercia operation but now and again there is one that Alan doesn't sell and he puts it into training himself. Such a horse is Without Reserve who wor at Leopardstown on Monday beating Foscarini (also bred by Mount Coote) in the process. The opposition were well and truly strung out behind the first two and so Without Reserve could well justify his owner-breeder's faith with more wins in the very near future.
