WITH ONLY a few hours to go to this evening's deadline for Limerick United and Limerick City to sort out their differences, Sunday's League game against Athlone Town still hangs very much in the ba-

Should both parties not have come up with a solution by 6.30, then it is quite conceivable that Limerick could be left without a club for the remainder of the season.

Mr. Pat Grace, chairman, Limerick City, denied news-paper reports this Friday that he is about to enter into a cash settlement with United supremo John McNamara, and he also denied that the two met in also denied that the two met in Dublin yesterday in an effort to resolve the crisis which has put Limerick soccer in the headlines over the past month.

But Mr. Grace did admit that he was willing to enter into a settlement with Limerick United, as distinct from

"Any cash that I am pre-pared to pay over will go to the company in trust," he said.

While he is confident that McNamara will sell out his interest, Mr. Grace is not too sure about the others who are waiting on the wings. "There are several other people who had an interest in Limerick United, and whether or not we will be playing Athlone Town on Sunday depends on their attitude."

"We are going to fight this even if it means going back


into court at the weekend," they said.

While indications are that the Limerick v. Athlone game will go ahead on Sunday, Mr. Grace said that there was still a possibility that things may not out as planned this evening.

"I am not going to buy half of anything - it is all or nothing - and unless all those with an interest in Limerick unitedly sign documentation to the effect that they are severing all interest in Limerick United then I am not going to become involved again." involved again.
