Despite being out of competitive fare for six weeks, Ewan Fenton's men put up a commendable performance in holding unbeaten Shelbourne to a 1-1 draw, and the only pity was that so few followers abandoned their firesides to welcome Joe O'Mahony and Co. back to the fold.
