THE ADVENT of multichannel TV in the pro-vinces and the threat of more 'live' coverage on Sundays is certain to signal changes in the structure of

LOI football.

Already, Limerick City have taken their cue and the board of directors this week threw light on the subject when they agreed in principle to investigate the possibilities of installing floodlights at Rathbane.

It has been suggested that upwards of 20 First Division and FA Cup games could be screened 'live' in the 1985-'86 season, with the majority on Sundays.

Many League of Ireland clubs are already on the bread line and have expressed fears of this extended TV coverage from England.

"We just cannot sit back—we have to take note", said Limerick City director, Michael Browne, who is of the opinion that the whole future of the LOI is in danger.

It is for that reason that City have included a flood lighting system in their plans for Rathbane, with the big switch-

on next winter.

Initially it was planned to instal lights at some future date but now they are seen as a main priority.

When City visited Milltown last Wednesday, members of the Board inspected Rovers' system and came to the conclusion that it would be ideal for them. The cost-an estimated £80,000.

Only four LOI clubs-Rov-ers, Home Farm, Bohemians and Dundalk-have lights, but it cannot be too long now until others follow.

TV's live coverage of the Tottenham Hotspur v. Liverpool game last Sunday affected attendances at LOI games, and in some cases there were no more than 300 people in attendance.
