Dear Cormac,

THANK you for affording me the space to substantiate my recent romarks.

The issue concerned centres around my belief that there is an "anti-club" feeling emanating from your newspaper. I would like to point out that this is not a recent grievance of mine. Three or four weeks after taking the job. Brian Flynn and myself found it serious enough to seek you out and discuss the matter. You assured us that you had no grievance with

You assured us that you had no grievance with Limerick City Football Club or any person within the club at any level. For our part we told you we would be available for comment, night or day. This I have adhered to on the few occasions you found it necessary.

I am still of the opinion your newspaper has an exe to grind with Limerick City.

Firstly, I would like te point out that I never sought to avail myself of a national platform. The national newspaper in question sent a reporter, all the way from Dublin, for an after-match interview. Something which your newspaper has yet to do and as you said yourself we are all entitled to freedom of speech.

I would like to make a stand for my players.

Since taking charge my players have had to withstand, unmerciful and at times, unjustified criticism from your newspaper. For example, one player's performance was described as being "so much out of it he could have phoned in his contribution." Very witty, very smug. Would it not have been sufficient to say the volute in the best sufficient to say the player had a poor game without adding malice? Are these the comments of a newspaper whose sports editor purports to "feel for" the players and who is not

antagonistic.
Players targeted for this criticism have to live and work amongst people who read your reports. People who may not have been to the matches to form their own opinion and therefore adopt the opinion of the local press, thus the importance of fair comment without malice.

You ask, are my players grown men or a bunch of youngsters starting at Primary school? They are, indeed, men, having withstood for so long this unmerciful criticism

withstood for so long this unmerciful criticism without any complaint. Results of which, may have shown in their play.

Criticism does indeed hurt deeply. As was illustrated by your own response to my few lines in the Sunday Independent. Your response being a huge editorial in your own paper and a published letter to the sports editor of the Sunday Independent. Unfortunately, my players do not have the same media space to answer their critics. This is why I stand in the corner of my players.

It is by coincidence that in in my opinion match reports when a national press reporter match reports when a national press reporter is in attendance, give a much fairer comment and reflection of balance of play, than is afforded in the Limerick Leader. Responsible national sports reporters do not

Responsible national sports reporters do not stoop to questionable journalism, such as inferring that —as supporters were leaving the ground, many said they would not be back — or — those who bought tickets for a cup tie would be willing to part with them before the game took place — or —as you said more recently, "I, in all honesty, could not suggest to anybody that they spend their money on going to watch this Limerick team." In the three instances above you suggest that supporters would not be coming back, that they should seek a refund on their tickets and should not turn up at all for games. The first two of these remarks, you allege you overheard from supporters, the third is from your own mouth. Cormac, if you don't want to come to Rathbane, don't bother, but don't abuse your privileged position in telling others not to. That's the equivalent of me using the national media to tell people not to subscribe to your

Inat's the equivalent of me using the hatlonal media to tell people not to subscribe to your newspaper. Something I would never stoop to. The power of the press is awesome. It can go a long way to help fill a soccer grounds or empty them, good or bad team performances have the same effect. Limerick City needs we need they are not stored. support through good times and bad.

I would dearly love to work in harmony with the local press to help fill Rathbane with supporters. Let us bury the hatchet and together we can hopefully help Limerick City to greater things and greater support.
