Replying to Mr. Nix, he said that he did not insert any details apart from his own signature. At the time, he went on, he was testing a lot of animals for export. The two farmers whose herd numbers were on the cards had animals tested quite often by him.

He told the court that the stamp he reported missing was his ordinary signature stamp: "The stamp U 19 was in my possession until the end of 1985. In fact I came back to Killaloe and used it the day I was interviewed by Mr. Hayes". He said that he had attached some significance to the loss of his signature stamp because "information came to me that a person had used my stamp, I went back to the office and found that it was missing. Then I went to Martin Kenirons".

The reason why he mentioned the fire at all to Mr. Hayes was because he had asked for the field books. "Certainly not", he replied to a suggestion that he was trying "to confuse to issue".

He denied saying that his date stamp had ever been stolen. A previous date stamp had been stolen, he said, but not the U 19.

When asked to explain how the cards in question indicated that he had carried out tests on the cattle, he said that Mr. Capper had come to his office looking for export certs for all the cattle he had purchased. He said that he himself was not in the office when Mr. Capper arrived.

More than 150 shareholders attended a stormy three-hour annual general meeting of the society at the River Room Motel, Newcastle West, this Wednesday night and strongly condemned the £802,000 deal with the Goodman International Group for the 29 per cent shareholding in the fac-

Shareholders demanded that the society's accountants identify the people whom they met in concluding discussions on the deal.

They also demanded to know whether the president of the ICMSA at the time, Mr. Con Scully, "was aware" of what was happening.
