LOTTERY VITAL TO SOCCER GRACE

LIMERICK CITY warned this Wednesday that should their weekly lottery fail then there was a strong possibility that there would be no League of Ireland football at

"The lottery is vital to the very survival of the game here", declared Mr. Pat Grace, who said that fortnightly expenses during the playing season amounted to over £3,000—"and with home gates of around £600 over the same period you can appreciate our situation", he continued.

The wage bill, according to him, absorbed the best part of £1,100 weekly, and after that one had to take into account travel expenses ground.
