BILLY HAMILTON claimed his first piece of silverware since he linked up with Limerick over two years ago when a Johnny Walsh penalty gave them a narrow win over Cork City in the Munster Senior Cup final at Rathbane on Wednesday.

But he must have agreed afterwards that the performance wasn't in keeping with their pole position in the League.

It was a dour sort of game it was a dour sort or game without any great pattern to play, but former City player, Ger Duggan, probably summed it up accurately towards the finish when he said, "Cork are always difficult to beat;"

Fortunes fluctuated over the 90 minutes. Limerick were masters in the first half, allowed their opponents to come back at them on the resumption, and then took over again in the final ten minutes when Joe Hanrahan was twice unlucky not to have found the target.

Hamilton was naturally enough delighted with the result and must see this as a possible launching pad for more success. Limerick had a price to pay, however, for their win: midfield Marcus Tuite received a nasty leg injury after about 25 mins, and is likely to miss the trip to

injury after about 25 mins, and is likely to miss the trip to Athlone on Sunday. It was master craftsman Johnny Walsh who brought the trophy back to Rathbane after a lapse of five years. It was newcomer Norman Kelly who "gifted" the penalty after 18 minutes. 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It took them 35 minutes to get in their first shot of note, with Barriscale saving brilliantly from Freyne, the former Newcastle West player.

Limerick were the more aggressive, and in the 37th minute Hanrahan sprayed the ball across the goalmouth, but

Then came a spell when the visitors threatened to take control. They won the midfield battle, and player manager Eamonn O'Keeffe made life a bit awkward for those at the back.

In the 67th minute Barris-cale was forced into making a cale was forced into maxing a fine save from O'Keeffe. Just when the game looked all over, there were incidents at both ends. Hanrahan was clean through but Harrington clean through but Harrington advanced to avert the danger and there was a moment of panic at the other end as an O'Keeffe free from just outside the area took a deflection and went over for a corner.

Limerick were relieved to hear the final whistle. It was only Hamilton's second win over them and he will be hoping for the 'hat-trick' when the sides meet again in the
