IN TRACING THE HISTORY of Prospect Football Club one is taken back to 1904 when the club was founded in the Halls Range

Among its founder members were Willie Shute who was secretary and who afterwards joined Limerick when they entered League of Ireland ranks and Jack Noonan whose brother Paddy, now residing in Janesboro' gave over 40 yeras service to Limerick AFC. Incidentally, Paddy's son, Mick, is at present a prmber of LDMC, having held with distinction the office of registrar for several years. Among those who played for the first Prospect team were goalkeeper Somy Doran, the McCormack brothers, Paddy and Dominic who resided next to Edward St. Garda Station; John Murray from Wolfe Tone Street and Mick and Jim O'Sullivan, from "Jack the Lads Lane", both of whom were killed in Among its founder members were Willie Shute

Street and Mick and Jim O'Sullivan, from "Jack the Lads Lane", both of whom were killed in World War 1. From Halls Range came Jack and Mick Noonan, Tom McIlroy, Martin Gleeson whose brother "Whack" played in the 1924-'25 Munster Junior Cup team, Paddy and Willie Flood, and Gus Neilan.

Prospects home ground then was at Corkanree, but as there were few teams in Limerick at the time they travelled frequently for games. Westonians were another club in Limerick around 1910 and among its players were Sam Browne whose son Ollie, later joined Young Munster RFC; Tommy Spencer, Bunty Sarsfield, Paddy Browne and Mick Hayes.

They also found opposition, football wise, in the British Army whose members played in the Barrack Field, and on one occasion, held the Black Watch senior team who were holders of the Army Cup to a 2-2 draw.

The First World War curtailed football activities for a few years, but Prospect were back again in the '20s.

Munster Junior Cup In 1924 they qualified for the final of the Munster Junior Cup when they defeated Victoria in Priory Park by 2 goals to 1.

The final was played in Victoria Cross in Cark and Prospect make history in becoming the first Limerick team to bring the MEA Cup out of Cork

Limerick team to bring the MFA Cup out of Cork when they defeated Freebooters Footballers Club by 1-0. Dan "Cha" Flanagan who played in goal in the semi-final and saved a penalty the same day, broke his collar bone shortly afterwards in a City Cup same for the Pailway Purphy wards in a City Cup game for the Railway Rugby wards in a City Cup game for the Railway Rugby team and was replaced for the final by Tom O'Shea. The team lined out as follows: Tom O'Shea, Gerry "Lamman" Griffin, Jimmy "Bunty" Sarsfield, Tommy O'Neill, Dan "Ferkie" Lynch, Paddy "Whack" Gleeson, Joe "Gossege" Patterson, Mick O'Connell, Bobby Ronan, Jackie Venners, Louis Simmonds.

In the 1924 Young Munster City Cup win "Whack" Gleeson Bobby Ronan and Mick O'Connell played in the final against Abbey. Ritchie Patterson, Jackie Venners, Bunty

Ritchie Patterson, Jackie Venners, Bunty Sarsfield, Ferkie Lynch and Tommy O'Neill also wore the famed Black and Amber, while Lamman Griffin won a senior cup medal the year they

won the Bateman Cup.

The next trophy to come Prospect's way was when they won the juvenile cup which was presented by Walsh's Drapery Shop in Wickham Street. This was won in 1926-'27.

Minors.

John Joe Connery from Quinn's Cottages started Prospect minor team in 1929-'30. They held their meetings in what was known as the "Shack", a cellar-room in Parnell Street. In that same year they reached the final of theminor cup but were beaten 2-0 by Crusaders. Playing for Prospect at that time were such notables as Nasser Keane in goals, Blarney Keane, Jimmy Cantillon, John Fahy, Gaffer O'Brien, Dummy Carey, Brendan and Paddy Kelly, Jackie Brouder. In 1931-'32, some of their players joined Trojans, among them Jimmy Cantillon, Tom O'Callaghan, Christy Sheehan and Mickey Trehy and the following season they defeated their old club in the minor cup final played at "Shack", a cellar-room in Parnell Street. In that their old club in the minor cup final played at Corkanree by 3-2 although Prospect led by 2-0 at half-time. Eddie Johnson and Blarney Keane scored for Prospect while Jimmy Cantillon (2), and Paddy Doyle assured Trojans of victory.

It was in 1933-'34 that the first shield to be competed for at junior level was presented by the famous "Duke" Breen from Newcastle West to the local council who operated from the old Rangers clubhouse. Serving junior council at that time were President, A. W. Simmonds, treasurer, Willie Shute, secretary, H. O'Brien; asst. secretary, Andy Byrnes, also Joe Scallan, Mick O'Connell and Paddy O'Neill.

Trojans were the first winners of the City Shield, a feat they also accomplished in 1935-'36.

Louis Simmonds and Blarney Keane later approached Cromer Jewellers, who presented a cup which up to recently was competed for local control of the control of the competency of the control of the c

cup which up to recently was competed for locally. Again it was Prospect's arch rivals, Trojans, who became the first winners and also lifted the trophy again in 1935-36.

Paddy Daly who was elected chairman of Pros-

pect when they reformed its junior side in the early sixties played for Trojans at this time.

Others to play for Trojans, among them many ex-Prospect players, were Blarney and Naser Keane, Danagher Sheehan, Mickey Trehy, Fer-kie Lynch, Jimmy Cantillon, Christy Sheehan, Charlie Hannon, Mattie Gray, Tom O'Callaghan, Christy Reddan, Dan Lonergan, Willie Woodrow, Pappy Keane, Dominic Keane and Pat Cronin.

Blarney, Naser, Danagher and Jimmy Cantillon played for Trojans when they became the second Limerick team to win the Munster Junior

Of the 1935-'36 Prospect team Tom Collery and Michael O'Brien went on to play with Limerick. Michael O'Brien, after leaving Limerick, then formed the famous Reds United with whom the present captain of Limerick Joe O'Mehony becan big occorre

O'Mahony, began his career.

After a lapse of a few years Prospect again entered football this time drawing from the Prosentered football this time drawing from the Prospect Housing scheme. George Mitchell, who is chairman of Limerick Schoolboy Council at present and who was recently rewarded for his services to football; christy Mungovin, Henry Kelly, Connie Ward and Dick Casey were instrumental on this. Prospect fielded some highly talented players at this time, among them Billy Hayes who later went on to play with Star Rovers and Limerick AFC who later transferred hi m to Wrexham with whom he gained International honours for Ireland.

Gerry Mason took up employment in England a few years later and half-back Mick Wallace, brother-in-law to Joe McKeown, is now residing in America. Richie Casey and Art Stubbins later emigrated to England while Gerry Noonan was regular number four with the Blues and Mick McMahon captained the side. A player who twenty years afterwards was to win a Lawson Cup McMahon captained the side. Frankie Johnson signed for Limerick in 1948 but returned to junior football several years later with Pike Rovers, with whom he won the Saxone Cup when Pike defeated Ballynanty Rovers in

Cup when Pike defeated Ballynanty Rovers in the Markets Field by 5-2.

Juvenile Cup

In 1946-'47, Prospect won the juvenile Cup when they defeated Pike Rovers 1-0 in Cals Park. They accomplished the same feat in '49 when they defeated Black Diamond by 3-1 at the Markets Field. The team lined out as follows: Jim Kearney, Paddy McCormack, Mick Killeen, Tommy Burke, Tom Kelly, Dick Meade, Paddy Moore, "Whopper" Hayes, Jim O'Reilly, Sonny Moore (capt.), Charlie McCormack.

Jim O'Rielly scored the goal against Arthesians in the semi-final while Charlie McCormack helped himself to two in the final. Blarney Keane refereed the game. Assisting

That same year, Prospect's minor side qualified for the final of the cup when they defeated Perryville by 3-0. In the final, played at the Markets Field, Prospect, who were league champions, took the lead against Pike Rovers through Willie Cusack. John Lynch was secretary of the club then, while Christy Galvin trained the schoolboys.

Rodney Hardaker

It was in August 1950 that Prospect centre-half Rodney Hardaker signed for Limerick. However his very promising career was cut short when a knee injury, sustained against Cork Athletic

forced him to retire from football.

In the 1951-'52 season the under-15 Lawson Cup was introduced. Prospect and Pike Rovers met in the first ever final of the competition played at Shelbourne Park on Sunday, September 14, 1952. Paddy Kiely refereed this game which ended in a draw and the replay took place the following Sunday at the Market Field. the following Sunday at the Markets Field. Pike took the lead in this game after only five minutes when Ger Waters scored. However, well-known when Ger Waters scored. However, well-known publican, Eamonn Maher equalised for Prospect. In the third game, played at Shelbourne Park. Pike again led at the interval through a Mick Kemmy goal and Prospect winger James Culhane equalised ten minutes into the second half. Mickey Killeen scored Prospect's second from the penalty spot and Ger Sheehan added their third to leave the scoreline 3.1 in Prospect's fayour. to leave the scoreline 3-1 in Prospect's favour. Outstanding star of the three games was undoubtedly Prospect's Mickey Killeen who was well supported by Pat Sheehan, Dessie McNamara, Ralph Prendergast, Dave Barry, and goalkeeper Tony Phayer, while Pike had their best players in Paddy O'Connor, Mick Kemmy, Jimmy Downes, Ger Waters, Harry Hartigan and Eamon Tuite.

Prospect also won the under 16 Cup in 1951.

Trials

The first Limerick team to play an under-15 international trail contained no less than six Prospect players. This game was held at Ozier Park in Waterford in March 1952 against a local selection. The game ended in a 2-2 draw in which Shelbourne's Ger Morgan had the misfortune to

score an o.g.

Pat Son O'Dwyer and Ger Waters scored for Limerick and inside-left Jimmy Downes of Pike Rovers was later selected on the Irish team to

Rovers was later selected on the Irish team to play Wales.

In June 1953, Prospect beat Rossa Villa by 9-0 in the Limerick area Munster Minor Cup. Ger Hussey and Ralph Prendergast had a hat-trick each while McNamara, Galvin and O'Halloran scored one each. Also in 1953, Pike Rovers defeated Prospect in a replay of the FAI Minor Cup area final by 4-3, to be beaten themselves by Glasheen (Cork) in the semi-final proper.

Ralph Prendergast, Mick Killeen and Junior Galvin took part in a minor trial in Waterford in February of that year

In the Limerick area final of the Evans Cup, Prospect defeated Pike Rovers by 1-0, the winner coming 15 minutes into the second half when Dave Barry (who, incidentally, captained Slattery's Inter-Pub winning team a couple of seasons ago) crossed for Ralph Prendergast to head home.

Juniors

The junior side in the early fifties contained such players as Frankie Coughlan, whom many consider to be one of the finest players to come out of the area; Sean Moore, Gerry Stubbins, Joe O'Loughlin, Pat O'Regan, George King, Mick Keenihan, Vincent Flynn, Tom Galvin, J. Kinnane, Paddy Flannery, Harry Mitchell, Mick Maher and Paddy Noonan.

Several of their players played with Limerick senior team, including Pat and Ger Sheehan, Pa Wilmott, Des and Freddie McNamara, Mick Killeen, Raply Prendergast and, of course, Frankie Johnson.

Success

The success of Prospect can be attributed to the people of the area, notable Sean 'Soccer' O'Neill in whose house the weekly meetings were held; Tom O'Doherty who died only recently and who devoted a lifetime to the club; Blarney Keane's brother, Donal and the late Thomas McNamara (father of Dessie and Freddie), who was also an (father of Dessie and Freddie), who was also an accomplished referee in his time.

Most successful season

Prospect had their most successful season in '60-61 and created a new record by winning the under-13, under-15 and under-16 leagues and cups, going through all competitions unbeaten.
The under-14 side, captained by Billy Harte,

collected runners-up honours in the league and

The under-15 side had a narrow escape in an under-15 league game against arch-rivals Wembley Rovers when down 3-0 to a hat-trick from Ned Morrissey. However, lady luck was smiling on Prospect when at the start of the sec smiling on Prospect when at the start of the second half the ball deflated and, without a replacement, the game had to be abandoned.

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

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Sean Moore, now president of Young Munster R.F.C., was captain that year. Mick Benson, Leo Doran, Kieran Downey, Pa Wilmott, Dave and Liam Constable and Fonsie Fitzgerald also played with the side. They were beaten by Limerick B in the semi-final of the Lawson Cup. They were beaten by Fairview Rgs., for whom Paddy Casey scored, in the final of the Minor Cup. Eddie O'Brien (goal), Tom McCarthy, Davy Clancy, Patsy and Leo Doran, Sean Colbert. Ger Dalton, Ger Lawlor and Mick Timmons were minors that year. mons were minors that year.

Recalled

After three years in junior football with Pike Rovers, Frankie Johnson was recalled in August, 1961, to the Limerick senior side. When Pearse Stadium was officially opened, Prospect opposed Pike Rovers in the semi-final of the Fr. Lyons Cup. Tony "Moxey" Meehan, who played with Fairview Rangers since schoolboys, played for Prospect that year, but returned to Fairview the following year and went on to win F.A.I. and M.F.A. Junior Cup medals with them. P. J. Meagher scored the first goal in Pearse Stadium in that game, which Prospect won by 2-1.

They were defeated by Geraldines 2-1 in the final of the 1962-63 Leonard Cup.

Again in 1963-64, after three games, they were defeated 2-1 by Star Rovers in the Leonard Cup final. However, they won the most coveted local trophy when they defeated Geraldines 1-0 in the final of the Lawson Cup — Jimmy Ryan being the scorer. Stadium was officially opened, Prospect opposed

In 1962-63 the minor team won the Minor Cup when they defeated Janesboro 2-1 in the final at the Markets Field. They also won the league in

the Markets Field. They also won the league in 1962-63 and again in 1963-64 under the guidance of Mick Clancy.

It was in 1963-64 that Pa Wilmott formed Prospect Athletic, together with Mick Timmons and Paddy Brennan. In a league game played at Pearse Stadium in February, 1964, both Prospect minor teams met and although Athletic led through a Mick Madigan hat-trick, United emerged winners by 4-3.

Dropped out

Prospect Utd. dropped out of minor football at the end of the season when several of their players joined Prospect Athletic.

Athletic concentrated on minors only for the next four years, in which time they won the league on three occasions and Ingle and Kenneally

gue on three occasions and Ingle and Kenneally Cups.

In 1963-64 they were defeated in the semifinal of the Munster Minor Cup by Waterford Bohemians. Mick Madigan was leading scorer in Limerick that year with 27 goals.

In 1965-66 they were beaten by Ballynanty Rovers in the Limerick area finals of the F.A.I. and M.F.A. Cups, and finished second in the Barry League. The team: Pat Hartigan, Jimmy Colbert, Ray Collins, Denis McGuinness, Mick Constable, Joe O'Mahony, John Fitzgerald, Henry Gavin, Mick Madigan, Ger Brennan, Mick O'Donnell, Ritchie Whelan, Ger Noble, Christy Ryan and Donal McCarthy also played for Athletic minors.



Joe O'Mahony was capped at Youth level against Northern Ireland and England and also

against Northern Ireland and England and also had a trial with Everton.

When Prospect Athletic ceased after 1966-67 it marked the end of Pa Wilmott's long association with the club, an era in which, supported by George Mitchell, John Lynch and John Collins, saw them become one of the most successful schoolboy and minor teams in Limerick.

Prospect United were beaten in the final of the Lawson Cup in 1966, and they too bowed out of junior football.

Joe O'Mahoney joined Limerick, while Ollie McCarthy, Ger Brennan, Jimmy O'Rahilly and Brendan Meagher won F.A.I. Junior Cup medals with Caledonians in 1970.

Ger Foley, Ted Slade, Bart Dillon and Ray Mitchell were involved in the running of Prospect Utd.

Ray Mitchell took charge of the under 12 and 13 teams in 1966-67, when they won the under 13 teams in 1966-67, when they won the under 12 Cup for the first time. In the final against Hyde Rovers, Eddie Smalle put prospect ahead and, although they lost the lead, two goals by Sean O'Callaghan in the last ten minutes saw them emerge 3-2 victors. Pa Benson was awarded the U-12 schoolboy of the year and the "Footballer of the Year" (all grades) was awarded for the first time to Sean O'Callaghan. The majority of this team joined Hyde Rovers the following year, with whom they won the U-13 Cup.

Ray Mitchell tried unsuccessfully for several years to get the junior side organised again and finally succeeded in doing so in 1972 (it was Frost's inter-pub team that generated interest), when a successful meeting was held once again in

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when a successful meeting was held once again in the Boherbuoy Bandroom. Mick "Mousie" Hannon was elected chairman; Christy McMahon, treasurer, and John Ahern, secretary. The committee consisted of Jimmy O'Shaughnessy, Jimmy Madigan, Tawsey O'Brien, Johnny Kiely, Christy Hayes, Henry Bouchier and, of course, Ray Mitchell. The late John Collins, who served the club in the 'fifties and 'sixties, was elected vice-chairman. Ollie Halvey succeeded Mick Hannon as chairman during that year and rendered tremendous service to the club up to the time of his tragic death. the Boherbuoy Bandroom. Mick "Mousie"

vice to the club up to the time of his tragic death.

In 1976 they won the President's Cup in a tournament run by Janesboro S.A.C. at Pearse Stadium. The U-14 team were defeated by Colbert United in the U-14 Cup final the same day.

Joey O'Donnell was awarded the U-14 Sports Star of the Year, while in 1975 the U-12 team

received the team of the year award. The only major trophy won by Prospect in the 'seventies was the 3rd Division League in the 1977-78 season, when they emerged clear winners, losing

son, when they emerged clear winners, losing only one game to Summerville. Fairview Rangers put paid to their hopes of a double when they defeated them in the semi-final of the cup.

Ger Griffin, Alfie and Ger Micks, Paulie O'Donoghue, Harry Mitchell, John Lynch, John Hayes, Dave and Christy Mulqueen, Fred Moynihan were some of the last schoolboys to play with Prospect when they opted out a couple of years ago.

years ago.

As president of the club today, George Mitchell has maintained an association with Prospect going back to 1944.

going back to 1944.

The present committee is as follows: chairman, Mick Madigan; secretary, Tom Sheehan; treasurer, Jimmy O'Shaughnessy. Committee: Stephen and Michael Corbett, Bobby Hickey, Arthur Mallon, Jimmy Kavanagh, Junior Carey, Joss Carroll and Jimmy Colbert.

On the playing side, side, Stephen Halpin has remained a loyal servant to the club, with whom he won schoolboy league honours in 1959-60.

Paddy "Whack" Gleeson is the only surviving member of the Prospect team that won the Muns-

member of the Prospect team that won the Muns-ter Junior Cup in 1924-25 and now resides in Schoolhouse Lane.
