Park on Tuesday evening.



71 FAI Cup heroes hold reunion

MEMBERS of Limerick AFC's FAI Cup winning side of 1971 are to hold a 40th anniversary re-union at Peter Clohessy's Bar on this Thursday, April 21, at 8pm.

Limerick AFC secured their first FAI Cup success 40 years ago, on Wednesday, April 21, 1971, when the side defeated Drogheda United after a replay at Dalymount Park. A number of UK-based members of the Blues Cup-winning side of four decades ago will attend the informal reunion this week at Clohessy's. The club did reach three cup finals prior to 1971, losing to Shamrock Rovers in 1965 (1-0 after a replay)

and 1966 (2-0), and again in 1977 when they went down to Dundalk. 1971 proved the breakthrough when Limerick AFC beat Drogheda United (3-0) in a replay to lift the trophy for the first time and trigger week-long celebrations. Limerick and Drogheda had originally played out a scoreless draw in Dalymount Park on the previous Sunday, April When Limerick AFCs Jack Tuohy and Mick Toomey travelled to Manchester and signed Irish international and Blackburn inside forward Andy McEvoy in August 1967, a new era of Limerick senior soccer beckoned. The club had lost those successive FAI Cup finals to Shamrock Rovers in the mid 1960s, but were back in the final five years later. The introduction of Scotsman Hughie Hamilton for the injured Joe Bourke after half-time in the replayed 1971 final with Drogheda was to prove decisive. With ten minutes gone Paddy Short turned his marker on the left wing and placed Davy Barrett who squeezed the ball inside Baxter in the Drogheda goal to give Limerick the lead and in a frenetic fifteen minute period the Blues got their hands on the trophy for the first time thanks to two well-taken goals by man of the match Hamilton. Soccer supporters are invited to come along and share their memories at Clohessy's tomorrow night.
