Bud is alive and well and living in Luton

WHEN THE Republic of Ireland play England at Wembley on this Wednesday the game will revive memories of Ireland's historic victory over the "cyld enemy" at Goodison Park in 1949. The visitors resorded a shock 2-0 win, and thus became the first country to defeat England on home soil. And on that famous team was Limerickman Bud Aherne, from Thomondgate.

Bud, a member of a well- play Spain. known soccer family starred at full-back for Ireland.

Recently he was the subject of an article in The Irish Post. Readers will be pleased to learn that Bud has not been lorgotten in his adopted land.

In fact, he is very much part of Luton He lives with his family in Stanmore Crescent and in the evenings, when he takes the dog for a stroll or goes down the road to visit his local club, people often stop him and talk about football — both then and now.

The youngsters in particular want tto know tto what extent the game has changed, how he would compare the present-day stars with the great names of the past. Bud, is, according to the Post, always happy to anwer their questions.

BEGAN The Limerick man is now a fresh 57. He began his football career with Limerick F.C. and played with them until the outbreak of the war He then joined the Irish army and was soon selected to play for their team. In 1941, the army side played the League of Ireland. Having completed his arrapell, Bud rejoined Limerick. army

Said Bud: "That's some story, Said Bud: "That's some story. You see; in Northern Ireland football is played on Saturday, while in the Republic it is played on Sundays. In Spain, we played the game on a Sunday. The result was that, when we returned to the North, we were suspended for playing on were suspended for playing on a Sunday

He played in the Northern Ireland League until 1949. At that point, Luton Town intervened and sought him. Bud himself doubted if, at the age of 30, he could stay the pace. But Luton insisted and he joined

them.
"It was great Here I was, an Irishman in Luton, with a great English club. And let's make no mistake about it. Luton were great in 1949/50," he said.

Shortly afterwards he was a member of that great Republic of Ireland team which beat England 2-0 at Everton.

He went on to collect 26 international caps.

Bud was a great favourite with the Luton football followers. Playing at left-back, he was a sportsman to his fingertips and reckons that his greatest moment was when Luton went into the first division.
