

YOUNG ATHLETE WITH A FUTURE

TEN-YEAR OLD Limerick athlete, Gerard Duggan, put up an excellent performance in the intercountry mile cross-country race at Oola on Sunday last. Although badly handicapped with an injured foot, he finished in good position and we may expect to hear more of him in championship class in the near future.

Although Gerard is not six months in competitive athletics, he has already made a name for himself as a boy of outstanding promise. His first outing was in the County Championships (under 10) at Kilmallock in September last, when he won a medal for each of the five events 100 yards, half-mile, high jump, long jump and shot. In addition, he took the Father Browne Cup for the best athlete at the meeting.

n subsequent competitions he has proved himself a very good all-rounder against strong opposition. His performances include third place in the Limerick "Round the Houses" race and fifth in an inter-county, road race in Clonmel on last St. Stephen's Day.

Gerard, who is a member of Limerick Athletic Club attributes his remarkable progress in the sport to the training which he has received from John Brosnan.

Other sports which claim his interest are hurling and football and in these he has won a medal for a schools league victory. He plays soccer with Hyde Rovers and captained last season's team that won the Streets League, Competition for Clare Street. Another outdoor sport he likes is

Gerard, who lives at 38 Singland East, Garryowen is a pipil of St. John Baptist School. His father, Mr. Frankle Duggan, was a prominent figure in local rugby and soccer circles.
