LIMERICK MEET CREWE ALEXANDRA

IN recognition of his excellent service to the club in the past seven seasons, Limerick A.F.C. make to-morrow night's game with Crewe Alexandra, the English Fourth Division side, at the Markets Field a Testimonial for Ewan Fenton, the newly-appointed Manager of Linfield, the Irish League club. The game will be Fenton's last in his 20 years as a professional footballer and it is hoped that local followers muster in force to pay tribute to the man who brought Limerick into the F.A.I. Cup final for two seasons running.

Limerick, who have now the unenviable task of finding a successor for Fenton during the close season, hope to try out three players with a view to signing them for the coming season. Two of them, I understand, will be Damien Bradley, ex-Sligo Rovers, and Waterford's Al Casey. They will be in the attack. The defence will be on the usual lines with Al Finucane, who played for the Republic of Ireland again Czechoslovakia in the European Nations' Cup tie on Sunday, and last night was honoured as "Soccer Personality of the Year" by the Irish Soccer Writers' Association in Dublin, at right-half.

ATTRACTION Crewe Alexandra are making their first visit to Ireland for

a number of years and they should prove a good attraction. They have just completed one of their best seasons in their long history, finishing among the top six teams in the Fourth Division.

The longest-serving member of the team is centre-half, Eric Barnes, who has made over 300 appearances for the club. Peter Leigh at left-back, is the captain of the side, having previously played for Manchester City.

Left-half, Mick Gannon, was with Everton and Scunthorpe before joining the club, while right-winger, Peter Gowans, spent two seasons with Glasgow Celtic. He hails from Dundee . . . the birthplace of Limerick's Ewan Fenton.
