Death of a legend

LIMERICK lost one of its most famous sporting personalities yesterday with the death of former soccer star and team manager, Ewan Fenton.

The 76-year-old died peacefully at his home in the city after a short ill-

Ewan's association with Limerick soccer is legendary, coming to the city to take over as player/manager of the local side in 1960.

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Born in Dundee in Scotland in 1929, Fenton soon went south and joined Blackpool with whom he remained as a first team player from 1948 to 1958, making 205 appearances.

In 1953 he was a member of the Blackpool side that won the FA Cup, beating Bolton Wanderers in what is still regarded as one of the

still regarded as one of the best finals ever staged at the famous Wembley Stadium.

Trailing 3-1 late in the game, Blackpool staged a dramatic recovery and inspired by the magical wing play of Stanley

Matthews, went on the win the final 4-3.

Ewan joined Wrexham in 1959, played 24 games with that Welsh club and accepted an invitation to take over Limerick AFC from their then secretary, Terry McGowan (of 'come on the Blues' fame) in the summer of 1960.

As League of Ireland

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As League of Ireland champions, Limerick were preparing for their first ever European Cup experience and Fenton played in both legs of the opening round, losing 5-0 to Young Boys of Berne in Thomond Park and 4-2 in the return game in 4-2 in the return game in

Switzerland. Ewan Fenton Limerick to their first FAI Cup final appearance in 1965, going down after a replay to Shamrock Rovers and it was the Hoops who inflicted a second final defeat on Limerick the following year when Fenton guided them to a second decider in succession.

Under Ewan's management, Limerick featured in further European appearances, losing to CSKA of Sofia in 1965 and to Torino of Italy six years

His playing days over, Ewan took over as manager


of the side and in 1971, he led Limerick AFC to their first ever FAI Cup success, beating Drogheda United 3-0 after a replay at Dalymount

He coached Linfield in Belfast for a short period, leading them to IFA league and cup successes before returning again to Limerick where he coached the senior side right up to the mid

A keen golfer, Ewan was a member of Castletroy Golf Club and ran a successful driving school in the city.

His contribution to senior soccer in this city has been enormous and news of his death has been received with genuine sadness. He was one of the most competent players that ever graced the Markets Field and his successes as a manager and coach are marked by his

achievements.
