

# Johnny Gavin was Spurs star

The chants at White Hart Lane In chants at White Hart Lane in recent times have been directed towards such stars as Hoddle, Ardiles. Crooks and Villa who contributed largely to Spurs victorious FA Cup run last season. But twenty-seven years ago the golden boy in North London was lime in the part of Savin. Limerick man Johnny Gavin, bought from Norwich City for one-sixtieth of the fee which Spurs

paid to Stoke twelve months ago for Garth Crooks.

With the Limerick-Spurs link being reconnected on Monday being reconnected on Monday with a visit from the Cup holders to Thomond Park, it is only fitting to recall Gavin's feats with the

to recall Gavin's leads triglish club.

In the summer of 1948 the Canaries brought two Limerickmen to Carrow Road. One of them Kevin Holman, stayed only briefly. The other, Johnny Gavin, remained to make 338 League and Cun appearances for Norwich Cup appearances for Norwich City and to sot up the club's aggregate scoring record of 132 goals—a record—which still holds to this

day.

His stay at Norwich was broken in October 1954, by a move from Tottenham. The Eire International believed to be one of only two players from the Republic to have graced the club's colours, made 29 Eirst Division appearances for them and topped Tottenham's scoring chart with an tenham's scoring chart with an impressive 13 goals. Before he left, early the following season, he had netted twice in three outings.

#### Four

In his debut with Spurs he scored four times against Sheffield Wed. Gavin, a native of the Janesboro' area of Limerick, had the distinction of playing in the company of such giants as Alf Ramsey, Eddie Baily and Ted Dirchburn.

To keep his place in the leading

goalscorers chart for 1954-'55 he had to compete with such giants as Glazzard (Huddersfield), Allen as Glazzard (Huddersfield), Allen (West Brom), Firmani (Charlton), Rowley (Leicester), Bentley (Chelsea), Voilett (Manchester Utd.), Milburn (Newcastle) and Lofthouse (Bolton). Nonetheless, the goals con-tinued to flow from the little winger, whose scoring appetite was matched by his speed and tenacity.
