Limerick-born goalkeeper Desmond Kelly is one of three footballers given free transfers by English Second Division champions Norwich City.

The former Hyde Rovers, Fairview and Drogheda net-minder had a month's trial with Norwich in September, 1970, and was taken on as a full-time professional two months later while in hospital recovering from an operation.

Last October he had a month's trial with Southend, and last week was on trial with Colchester United. He made, in all, five Football Combination appearances for Norwich City.

Desmond is a cousin of Dublin-born Phil Kelly, the former Norwich City full-back, who won five caps for Eire before damaged knee ligaments finally ended his league career in 1967.

The ex-Limerick CBS pupil is in his early twenties, and stands at over 6 feet.
