Des Kennedy's 22 for the record

Janesboro' United's dashing centre-forward, Des Kennedy, must surely qualify for inclusion in the Guinness Book of Records following his amazing feat in scoring a "hat-trick" in each of his last six outings!

Having thumbed through the record books this week, I failed to unearth a similar scoring burst by an individual player.

And that is not all... in the six games under review, the lanky 'Boro' striker has hit the remarkable total of 22 goals.

It all started last month when he helped himself to a "hat-trick" in his team's 6-0 win over Fairview in the final of the Under-17 League.

A few days' later he rammed home three more, against 'Boro's "B" squad, and followed up with a "hat-trick" against powerful Hyde. Des went one better when he hit four goals against St. John's and, to better that again, was on the mark five times in 'Boro's 10-0 victory over Nenagh.

Ballynanty "B" fell 6-0 to the Black-and-Whites and, needless to say, the Garryowen youth was in scoring mood with a further four goals to his credit.

And, as a bonus for scoring all those goals, Des was given a free day last Sunday. Ballyclough must have given a sigh

of relief when they heard that Kennedy wouldn't be in action against them. Still, without their ace marksman, the south city club won 7-2.

It cannot be too long until young Kennedy adds to the schoolboy international "cap" he won last year.


