Noel Murphy played his part in Limerick's first European adventure

SOCCER and rugby have always had a close affinity to each other in this sports-mad region but few will remember that one of the country's best ever international back-row forwards played his part in Limerick AFC's first European adventure following their League of Ireland success in 1960.

Noel Murphy, who played most of his club rugby with Cork Constitution, was capped over 40 times for Ireland, but also had two seasons with Limerick club Garryowen FC.

Transferred to Limerick in 1959 he joined the light blues in Dooradoyle and soon accepted an invitation to train Limerick AFC at the Markets

"They had won the League of Ireland for the first time the previous season and had qualified for the European Cup so it was felt that they needed to be extra fit as the opening round was taking place at the start of the new campaign," Noel told the Limerick Leader.

"I can't remember who invited me to train the team but the name Rene Cusack comes to mind. Ewan Fenton, the former Blackpool star, had agreed to join Limerick and I was brought in to fill the gap and take the team through their training two nights a week. Fenton arrived early in August and Limerick played the Young Boys of Berne in Thomond Park in the first week of September in 1960 and lost 5-0.

Few people would associate Cork rugby legend Noel Murphy with Limerick soccer.

When his business brought him to Shannonside he was immediately snapped up by Garryowen and played with them for almost two seasons. Murphy was very popular and well-liked when he was here but Limerick players who remember him during that era regarded him as a very tough task-master at the training

"Maybe it was because he was used to training for rugby that he brought such discipline and such a high work-rate to the training camp at the Markets Field," recalled Eric Costelloe who was with Limerick at the time. "We all got on very

well with him but we were not used to putting in so much effort so early in the season. Noel was fierce fit at the time and our lads certainly found his training techniques challenging.

The Limerick soccer team of the time was a curious mix of Corkonians, Dubliners and home-produced talent. Donie Wallace and Gerry O'Brien came from Leeside with Harry McCue,

Clem Dillon, Georgie Lynam, Fergus Crawford, Willie Clinton and Paddy Skelly putting in their pre-season training in the capital

soccer. As league champions they qualified for Europe for the first time and with a trip to Berne in Switzerland beckoning players jockeyed for favour with new boss Fenton. There was a core group of automatic choices such as Gerry McCarthy, recently returned from a few seasons with Charlton Athletic in the English first division; wonder winger Dick O'Connor, the sturdy Dessie McNamara and left full-back Joe Casey who was already a legend of city soccer.

Others were on the fringes such as youngsters Eric Costelloe, Kevin Fitzpatrick and Mick Doyle while Denis Linnane, Paddy Hackett, Tony Brosnihan and PJ Meagher fought hard to uproot the outsiders

Noel Murphy came to Limerick in the summer of 1960 at a time when he was one of the most exciting young back-rows in the country. It was a major boost for the light blues at the time having lost to Shannon the previous seasion in the semifinal of the Munster Senior Cup. Murphy made a big impression at Dooradoyle and the following season he helped them to the final where they met his former club, Cork Constitution at a packed Thomond Park.

The Garryowen team that day in 1961 read: Tony Colbert; Dick Dunworth, Billy Harris, Jack Ryan, Bobby Cotter; Davy Keane, Brian O'Farrell; John O'Dwyer, Joe Quinn, Tom Coffey; Tom Nesdale, Liam Downey; Sean Brosnahan, Tim McGrath and Noel Murphy.

Constitution won that final 12-5 with Garryowen's scores coming from a try by Dick Dunworth and a conversion from full-back Tony Colbert. Noel Murphy went on to win 41 caps for Ireland between 1958 and 1969, won numerous Munster caps and was on two Lions tours.

A former Munster President he is still deeply involved in Irish rugby, holds IRFU positions and

is a trustee of Munster Rugby.

Despite a lifetime of involvement with the oval ball game, Noel still remembers his short sojourn with Limerick senior soccer: "It is a long time ago but I still remember those days. I recall some of the players such as Joe Casey and Gerry McCarthy and Des McCarthy and they were a great bunch of lads who put great effort into the
