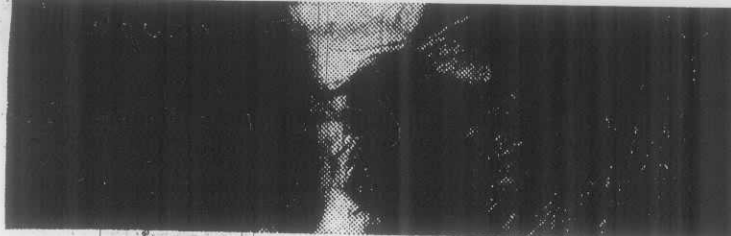

She likes travelling, and has only just returned from Brussels. Her other interests are music and drama, and she is a member of Feile Luimni.
