Joe Waters enhances his claims

Joe Waters hopes of claiming a regular spot on the Republic of Ireland international team were given a boost late last year when he was drafted into the panel for the Nations Cup game against Northern Ireland at Windsor Park.

Though he failed to get into the side from the start, he was drafted into a midfield role midway through the second period when Gerry Daly was injured. And Waters thought he played well enough to warrant a recall for the forth-coming international against England.

The 25 year-old Limerickman has had his ups and downs at international level. He won his first cap in Ankara in 1976 when, from the full-back position, he scored the Republic's equalising goal in their 3-3 draw with Turkey. By all accounts he had a fine game in a position which was new to him. However, a lot of water flowed under the bridge until he was next summoned into action-against Northern Ireland. Such is the quality of Joe's play in his capacity as captain of Grimsby Town that the Republic's team manager, Johnny Giles, just cannot ignore his form. The former Wembley Rovers schoolboy has the fishing port club sitting pretty in the top four of the Third Division and also guided them to the quarter finals of the League Cup, in which they were beaten by Wolverhampton Wanderers.

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AMAZING

He had an amazing start to his career in England, Joining Lefcester City at the age of 15, he made his debut two years later—in the quarter final of the FA Cup. Leicester's opponents on that day were Queens Park Rangers. The unknown Waters helped himself to the headlines on the following day with a brace of goals that sent the Midlanders into the semisfinals.

"I thought that my achievement then was going to be my launchong pad to greater things, but unfortunately this was not to be. Leicester had a big number of experienced players at the time and when Alan Birchenall recovered from injury, I was relegated to the subsench."

Waters became disillusioned with reserve team football. He asked for a transfer, which was reluctantly agreed to by the club. Grimsby heard he was available and their supporters came up with the £10,000 transfer fee demanded." I must admit at being

"I must admit at being apprehensive about joining the Mariners. After all it was a drop from Division One but I wanted regular first team football and that happened at Blundell Park. Also a crucial factor was the research crucial factor was the response of the fans. They made me feel at home and in the end the decision to come to Grimsby was an easy one

Ironically, he was not the boss's choice for the captaincy. Explained

Joe: Back in August, 1977, Keith Hanvey was all set to take the job, but an unfortunate injury kept him out of the early season games. The added responsibility of captaincy has helped to improve my game and temperament-after all, the captain cannot afford to have a string of

He admits that in his first season as captain he did have problems and at times found it hard going. In and at times found it hard going. In this respect he praises manager John Newman. "He made me real-ise my potential, made me work at my game and has given me the con-fidence in my own ability."

With Grimsby in fourth spot in the Third Division, Joe is hopeful

that he can lead them into the sec-ond. He is enjoying his football with them and in his three seasons at Blundell Park has won the respect and admiration of all those

respect and admiration of all those connected with the Mariners. His ambitions are to bet back into the Irish squad and to play again in the First Division. When Grimsty played Liverpool in the FA Cup at Ansfield over a week ago Joe was watched by his father, Ned, a former Garryowen player, and his two uncles, Gerard and Tony. "They are my most ardent admirers," he concluded.
