Limerick soccer community mourns death of Sean Cusack

WITHOUT doubt, Sean Cusack, who died this week, was one of the most accomplished inside forwards every to don the blue jersey of Limerick AFC.

He was capped for the Republic of Ireland against France in the World Cup qualifiers at Dalymount Park on November 16, 1952, agame that ended 1-1. Also in that side were two other Limerick players, Johnny Gavin from Janesboro, who starred with Norwich and later with Tottenham Hotspur, and Tom 'Bud'Ahern who played with Luton Town.

Sean Cusack made his League of Ireland debut with Limerick at the Markets Field in season 1946/47, joining a local side that included Willie O'Grady, Eamonn Clancy (who was later to win a Munster Senior Cup with Shannon in 1960), international goalkeeper Willie Hayes, Johnny Gavin and Kevin Holman.

In an era where wingers played close to the whitewash and the inside right and inside left operated as modern-day

midfielders, Sean Cusack was gifted with exceptional footballing skills and his contribution to both senior and junior soccer (where he played with Ballynanty Rovers) have never been forogtten.

He helped Limerick AFC to their first every League of Ireland success on Sunday, November 1st, 1953 when they beat Dundalk in Oriel Park in a thriller. Trailing 2-0 with 20 minutes remaining, Cusack showed calmness to slot home a penalty that brought Limerick back into it at 2-1.

Minutes later Georgie Lynan shot past Dundalk keeper D'Arcy to equalise and the winner from Paddy 'Beaver' Cronin created Limerick soccer history. The victorious Limerick AFC side included Batey Neilan, Georgie Lynam, Sean 'Geezer' O'Dwyer, John Neilan, Willie Aherne, Willie O'Grady, Patsy Collopy, Peter Bradley, Sean Cusack, Gerry O'Grady, captain; Paddy 'Beaver' Cronin and Mick Hayes. Willie 'Blarney' Keane was the team manager.

Husband of the late Nancy, Sean Cusack, who passed away at the Midlands Regional Hospital, Portlaoise, is survived by his daughters Rosemary and Regina, sons Kieran, Declan and Seán, sons-in-law, daughters-in-law, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, brother, sister, relatives and friends.

His funeral mass took place at St Munchin's Church on Tuesday with burial afterwards in Mungret Cemetery.
