STREET NOMENCLATURE

(To the Editor, "Limerick Leader.")

Dear Sir: A very interesting news item in your journal this week to the effect that the local Council of Clonmel Poblachta want the names of four of the City's principal thoroughfares changed has caused a flutter, no less important than the Robinson Turpin fiasco, among the members of the Limerickmen's Social Club here in Dublin.

Surely the young, energetic, intelligent patriotic members of Ireland's newest political party know, or ought to know, that Henry Street, William Street and Catherine Street are not called after English monarchs, no more than the George Hotel is named after any member of the Gwelp or Tudor households!

As far back as forty years ago the local school children attending Quay Lane Schools were taught, among other things, that the Arthur family (whose vaults are in St. Mary's Cathedral, and whose illustrious names occur no less than 45 times in the long list of Limerick's Mayors) had no fewer than eleven streets in their native Limerick called after them, included in which were: Patrick, William, Francis, Ellen, Robert, Catherine, etc., etc. Even the block of houses in Arthur's Quay formed the letter "A," so great was their influence!

Also, the name of Henry Roche, of the hanging gardens fame, which were to the rear of the G.P.O. in Cecil Street, is best remembered in Roche's Street and Henry Street, whilst, what was once known as South Henry Street, is now commonly called Carey's Road.

Finally, there is no such place as Rutland Street in Limerick; there was, but during the campaign by the great Apostle of Temperance, it was very properly changed to Father Mathew Place (which was long before the beverage was introduced from 1840 to 1850 a pity), so what? Yours etc.

Fined £5 For Road

GRANTS TO CO. LIMERICK LESS THAN HALF LAST YEAR'S

CO. Limerick's grants this year under the Local Authorities (Works) Act may not exceed £36,000, according to Co. Engineer M. G. Ahern.

Last year the Council received £75,000 with which to carry out drainage works throughout the County, the Engineer told last Saturday's Co. Council meeting.

Nearly this year, the Engineer said, the Government sanctioned an interim grant of £12,000 under the Act. Quite recently there was official intimation that between now and the end of the calendar year £15,000 more would be forthcoming.

"The Government states that this will be a substantial proportion of our entire receipts under the Act during the current financial year," the Engineer said. "That suggests to me that our entire receipts will not exceed £36,000, less than half what we got last year and the previous year. That is a pity because really valuable work was done with the money we got and some of that work which had to be left unfinished badly needs completion."

ENGINEER'S SCHEME.

Mr. Ahern told the Council that, as requested by the Government, he had prepared a scheme under the Act under which this year he had hoped to spend £80,000 on drainage works. This included bog development work, the building of a bridge in the Cappamore area, and the completion of a number of schemes unfinished in the last two years' programmes. The Council had pointed out that the costs of its turf production schemes would depend largely on the amount of State aid made available for the preliminary development of the bogs. The Department actually had assigned portion of the monies to be spent under the Act to bog development. He hoped, too, that the building of a bridge at Tooragh, Cappamore, would become eligible under the Act. Originally it had been the Council's intention to apply for a loan to finance the bridge project. He thought that if the job qualified for Act grants, the better it would be for the local ratepayers.

"Our main priority problem at the moment," he said, "is how much of the uncompleted river clearance work we can finish. I think the least the Department might do is give us the wherewithal to finish the works on which we made a start."

FLOODING AT ABBEYFEALE.
