Bruff's U-21 'A' football success in Knocklong came after an extraordinary final five minutes when they turned a five point deficit into victory by six over St Patrick's, a mirror image of Limerick's 1994 All-Ireland final collapse against Offaly.

Up to the moment when Shane Irwin's free sparked the revival, the Saints had never looked in danger.


