Munster Senior Cup For Thomond

IN one of the finest and hardest-fought games seen in Cork for many years, Thomond last night (Thursday) won the Munster Senior (Outdoor) Water Polo Cup when defeating a strong Dolphin team by 2 goals to one.

On Tuesday night the Limerick team travelled to Cork and had a deserved 6-4 win over Sunday's Well, holders of both Indoor and Outdoor Cups, and who, incidentally, had not been on the losing side since 1944.

Dolphin opened the game with an all-out attack, which was sustained until half-time in an effort to wear down the opposition.
