A YOUNG Limerick man, Mr. P. McMahon, of 18, Prospect Hill, broke two Irish weight-lifting records on Saturday night during a Limerick v. Clonmel weightlifting match in the Dalcassian Hall, Island View, Limerick.

What are reckoned to be the first weight-lifting contests ever to take place in Limerick were held in the Dalcassian Hall, Island View, on Saturday night and were marked by the smashing of two Irish re-cords by a member of the Limerick team which opposed a Clonmel
