Mr. J. Feehan, Brosna, said that on 23rd June he found a large stone (produced), with broken pieces, in Lane's kitchen. Defendant, when questioned, denied all knowledge of the offence.

Guard M. Hayes, Brosna, said he had interviewed defendant, who denied all knowledge of the offence and refused to make a statement.

**DEFENDANT EXAMINED**  
Defendant, in evidence, said that on 15th June he returned from a football match in Newcastle West about 8.30 p.m. and went home for a few drinks in the village. On 22nd June he returned from a match in Limerick. He did not knock Lane's door or throw a stone through the window. Lane's wife was very bad terms with himself and his father-in-law.

Replied to the Inspector, defendant admitted he had been previously arrested in England and was brought home on a summons for a maintenance of his wife, and sent to prison.

**CONFLICT OF EVIDENCE**
