TWO SURPRISES

The results from the senior hurling championship ties played at two venues last Sunday saw the fancied teams go out.

At Limerick, Patrickswell proved the fitter side and easily accounted for the disappointing Cloughman side. The 4-7 to 2-2 winning margin tells the story and on this form the 'Well boys are capable of making a bold bid for honours.

At Bruree, Emmets, the South Board representatives, piped the fancied Feohanagh side by one point on the score of 7-4 to 6-6. This was an exciting game in which the Southernmen succeeded in holding the club team to level terms at the interval.

On the turnover, Emmets went two goals and one point ahead, but a strong Feohanagh rally failed to win the day.

In the semi-finals, Patrickswell oppose Emmets, whilst the winners of the Feenagh-Kilmeedy v. Western Gaels tie qualify to meet either City Gaels or St. Patrick's.

Referee floored at St. John's Pavilion

THE referee was floored by one of the contestants and the audience booed, howled and cheered at St. John's Pavilion, last Monday night, during the international wrestling contest. A member of the audience, who stated he was "crazy about boxing," actually climbed into the ring to "get at" Syd McManus during his bout with Randolph Turpin, former middle-weight boxing champion of the world. It was a night of nights for Limerick followers of the game and groan game and the pavilion was full for the occasion. Some came to witness wrestling for the first time, while others said they came along to see the "act."

But whether it was an "act" or the real thing, it was well done and everybody enjoyed the display. When the bouts were over and the grunting and groaning had finished there were many who shouted "more, more," while others gave the slow hand-clap, not realising that the programme had come to an end. There was a small piece of excitement left, however, as the member of the audience who had climbed into the ring followed McManus back stage to remonstrate with him over the way he threw "Randy" around the ring. The man later emerged unscathed, and there were quite a few who expected that his emergence would be more rapid.

Members of the audience approached the ring during the contests and offered, with typical Limerick humour, to "take on" the two contestants together. One of them got somewhat of a shock, however, as he was lifted bodily off the ground and suspended in mid-air by one of the wrestling giants amidst laughter from the crowd.

There were four contests in all and the second one, which was won by Gentleman Jim Lewis, world champion, was the most keenly contested and was thoroughly enjoyed by the crowd.

At the outset the referee stated that the bouts would be won by two falls, two submissions or a knockout. Before each bout he formally examined the soles of the shoes of each contestant for any illegal fittings.

The Turpin-McManus fight was easily the highlight of the night. At the beginning of the other bouts the contestants shook hands, but at the commencement of this contest, McManus turned away ominously from Turpin's proffered hand. McManus was the bigger man—he comes of a famous wrestling family—but this did not matter to Turpin, who threw him around the ring just as easily as he threw Turpin.

Turpin was obviously very popular with the audience and shouts of "box him, Randy" were frequently heard over the din of the crashing wrestles, and the grunts and groans. McManus refused to "break" from grips sometimes when told to do so by the referee who then had to put a "nose-lock" on him. On one occasion McManus grabbed the ref. and sent him crashing to the floor. The fight went on, however, and the ref. seemed to get his own back later when he twisted McManus's foot around the rope of the ring and left him in contortions. Turpin, who is the best paid wrestler in England, was the winner but all parted the best of friends.
