Chieftain sets sail for three in a row

LIMERICK property magnate Ger O'Rourke has set his sails in pursuit of his third success in a row in the Round Britain and

Ireland Yacht Race.
Ger and his crew on his yacht, Kingspan Chieftain, are currently in the lead in the arduous event which can take up to two weeks to com-

plete.

They are in good form as already this summer they have won a class in the BMW Round Ireland Yacht Race and competed strongly at Cork week international sailing event at Crossbayen. ing event at Crosshaven.

The boat and crew set off at 6pm this Monday from Cowes in England and went straight into the lead.

On Tuesday morning, the day after the race started, Ger O'Rourke spoke via satellite phone

'Kingspan Chieftain start and after three hours of rac-ing we were just off St Catherine's Point and in the lead on corrected time," said Mr O'Rourke. They remain in the

lead but are facing some very severe weather conditions off the west coast

of Ireland.
Kingspan Chieftain's navigator Jochem Visser says they are beating into head winds gusting up to 33 knots.
"It is really uncomfort-

The gruelling event is run over a racecourse distance of approximately 1,789 miles. They begin on the South Coast of England move west-wards into the Celtic Sea and continue around Great Britain and Ireland.

This is Mr O'Rourke's latest voyage and judging on previous form he is set to go very close as he has won events on both sides of the equator.

The successful property developer's yacht claimed class honours in the Sydney to Hobart Race 2005, it crossed the line to win the IRC Class Zero UK National Championship.
