



Sean bids for Atlantic crossing glory

A FORMER Dell worker is hoping to realise a personal goal this winter when he attempts to row single handedly across the Atlantic ocean.

Sean McGowan, from Thomondgate, hopes to become the first Irish man to successfully row solo across the Atlantic when he takes to the waves on December 6.

The epic journey will take up to 100 days, and last over 2,500 nautical miles - and Sean hopes to raise €100,000 for the Soweto Connection - a charity set up in Limerick to support African com-munities ravaged by aids.

Sean - who left Dell in Raheen last month - said: It has always been my personal goal to take on this cross Atlantic chal-lenge and a number of months ago I decided tat now was the right time for

"I have just completed an MBA and always targeted the completion of that programme as when would dedicate more time to rowing.

"After many months of consultation with my wife and children we decided to go for this event in 2009.

It is a huge commitment from my family as much as myself but it would not be possible without their support."

In preparation for his voyage, Sean has taken on a strict nutrition regime and has ben travelling to Arklow on a regular basis for open water training.

One of the toughest things to prepare for is the mental aspect of the event which will mean 24 hours a day in just my own company," he stated. In a unique twist,

schoolchildren all over the country will, through a satellite link, be able to send support to Sean as

he rows. The initiative, code-named 'Shout out to Sean' is open to all schools and youth groups. And every-one can follow Sean's progress, and read his blog on the atlantic09.com web site.
