

## Death of a great Limerick hurler

Having hald tribute to Joe Ryan of Ahans, many of the great men of the glorious hirties regathered all too soon to have tach last respects to another staiwart of that unlotted table era -Ned Cregan of Money and the staiwart of the staiwar

other stalwart of that unforgetable era -Ned Cregan of Monegày.

Born when the century was still in its infancy, Ned Grégan was ushered into the greatest hurling spell ever in Monegay, and from his own infancy he great unting days, and the great nurling days, and the great nurling days, and the grand men that made the well-kin ring in that period beyond compare in the G.A./. history of the parish.

Ned's father played foothal in the years when the G.A./ was only establishing itself, but it was hurling which held the stage an the stirring years of Ned's tupbringing. A big mistake that must surley have been regretted in after years was the complete concentration then in Monegay on the senior side, and there were no organised games for the RUDIMENTS

Ned, consequently, had to paddle his own canoe in learning the rudiments of the game, but later much of the craft of hurling came to him through association with such stalward wicklers as Willie Hough Mick Dansher, the Shanahans of Rathcanil, the Greenss—Don and Roger; Paddy D'Connell, Brian King and the Mackessys. They trained in the field that the parish priest—the late Rev. Father Edward Clifford, always placed at the disposal of the fings of this group that young Ned and his contemporaries got to know and love the national game.

"The glory days were over, however, for Monegay, when Ned was ready to line out "with the men," and so it happened that his first competitive game was played with Newcastle West in 1919 a golden spell there then, for they had just led Limerick to 1918 All-Treland renown with Willie Hough 'as captain Ned Cregah was also closely associated with the struggle for national independence, and what should be his greatest hurling years—from 1919 to 1925, were devoted to the service of Ireland during a period of Irish history that for the sheer magnificence of the courage and heroism of its fighters is not easily equalled.

When Ned resumed his appointments with the playing fields of the Gael in 1925, Monegay was still without a team, and he lined out with the Ashford junior hurlers before returning to the Newcastle West colours and to enjoy with a great fifteen a spell of regal brilliance that, unfortunately, had not been repeated in the capital of the West.

Ned was called to the county junior colours in 1927, and at Clommel, on 12th June that year, they beat Tipperary, 5-4 to 3-2. I have only the surnames of his colleagues on that occasion. They were: Messrs, Monahan, Flayin, Hurley, Condon, Fitzgerald, O'Connot, Clokessy, Cross, Fitzgerald, Condon, Davis, Aherne, Lynch and Hannon, Could any reader fill in the Christian names and clubs? It would add, to our hurling history.

In the second round, they beat Cork, at Dungarvan, 4-5 to 2-3 on 14th August; and on 11th September, at Kilrush, they collected the Munster crown, when they beat Clare, 4-4 to 12-2. It was the end of the road for Limerick, however, for in the All-Treland semi-final, played at Thurles, on 30th October, Meath beat them, 5-2 to 2-0.

The date was the 17th June, and it proved a truly wonderful struggle, which for speed, dash and high class hurling, could not be excelled. Limerick won, heating Clare 1-8 to 2-2. "CRITERION"

Best criterion of his worth as a hurler can probably be got by a look at some of the men he played against—mention of whose names recall bright lights indeed in Ircland's hurling lore—the great Martin Kennedy and John Joe Callanan, of Tipperary; the, one and only Matty Power, of Kilkenny; Dorks pride, "Gah" Aherne; another sound Leeside score-getter. J. Kenneally, and the Connact And Galway star, J. Deely, to bring to memory but a few of the many he met and mastered in the great days of Limerick hurling power and majesty.

When Ahane Hurling Club was revived in late 1926, after a lapse of sixteen years, one of the first members to join its playing ranks was twenty-yearsold Joe Ryan, whose recent death evoked much sympathy in the district; where he was always a popular figure.

Joe made his first appearance in county colours in the Munster Junior Hurling Championship at Paire na nGael on 24th August, 1930, in which Limerick lost to (Tipperary, 5-4 to 2-5. Joe appeared in successive junior games in which Ahane beat Young Ireland, St. Patricks, Caherline and Temple-glantine to reach another Co. Junior Hurling Championship final.

He continued on the winning trail for very many more years, but when he married in 1934 he considered it was time to give way to younger men.
It was only fitting that the greats of Ahane hurling should meet at his funeral to shoulder his coffin and render the last honours that a noble hurler and great club man deserved.
