The Olympic Games at present progress—and with a young Limerick athlete only just out of his teens. Neil Cusack, one of our most promising representatives, naturally brings our thoughts back to other great days of the Olympics, and of athletic championships; and to the successful participation of Limerick in same.

Death of a great Limerick hurler

BY "CAMAN"

'Having' paid tribute to Joe Ryan of Ahane, many of the great men of the glorious hurling gathered all too soon to pay their last respects to another stalwart of that unforgettable era—Ned Cregan of Monegal.

Born when the century was still in its infancy, Ned Cregan was ushered into the greatest hurling spell ever in Monegal, and from his own infancy he grew up with the storied of the great hurling days, and the great men that made the hurling ring in that period beyond compare in the G.A.A. history of the parish.

Ned's father played football in the years when the G.A.A. was only establishing itself, but it was hurling which held the stage in the stirring years of Ned's upbringing. A big mistake that must surely have been regretted in after years was the complete concentration then in Monegal on the senior side, and the young Ned organised games for the youngsters.

RUDIMENTS

Ned, consequently, had to paddle his own canoe in learning the rudiments of the game. He was the first of the great hurling came to him through association with such stalwart wielders as Willie Hough, Mick Danaher, the Shanahans of Rathcanill, the Greenses—Don and Roger; Paddy O'Connell, Brian King and the Mackessys. They trained in the field that the parish priest—the late Rev. Father Edward Clifford, always placed at the disposal of the hurlers, and it was on the fringe of this group that young Ned and his contemporaries got to know and love the national game.

The glory days were over, however, for Monegal, when Ned was ready to line out "with the men," and so it happened that his first competitive game was played with Newcastle West in 1919—a golden spell there then, for they had just led Limerick to 1918 All-Ireland renown with Willie Hough as captain.

ABANE FOUNDER

When Abane Hurling Club was revived in late 1926 after a lapse of sixteen years, one of the first members to join its playing ranks was twenty-year-old Joe Ryan, whose recent death evoked much sympathy in the district where he was always a popular figure.

Joe made his first appearance in county colours in the Munster Junior Hurling Championship at Pairc na nGael on 24th August, 1930, in which Limerick lost to Tipperary, 5-4 to 2-5. Joe appeared in successive junior games in which Abane beat Young Ireland, St. Patrick's, Chertone and Templeglantine, to reach another Co. Junior Hurling Championship final.

That was played at Groom on April 19th, 1931, and resulted: Abane, 8-6; Bruere, 1-3.

The first senior game Joe figured in for the county was the Kilmallock Tournament at Kilmallock, in which Limerick drew with Tipperary, 2-6 to 3-3. The date was 21st February, 1932.

He continued on the winning trail for very many more years, but when he married in 1934 he considered it was time to give way to younger men.

It was only fitting that the great Abane hurling should meet at his funeral to shoulder his coffin and render the last honours that a noble hurler and great club man deserved.
