But for losing by 15 yards to Matt Rudden, St. Augustine's, Dublin, in the Irish two miles championship at Ballyhooley, Cork, on August 13th, John would have had a "clean slate" during 1961. He was unbeaten up to then in 30 starts, and numbered six Irish titles (3, 4, 5 and 6 miles; 8,000 metres and senior crops-country) among his successes, to equal the record set up by Peter McArdle in 1955. A prominent member of the F.C.A., John will be a strong challenger next month for the All-Army Cross-Country Championship. He has only to finish in the first six to be sure of selection for the International Military Championship at Portugal next April. And we believe he is capable of winning both events!
