Member Of Famed Athletic Family Dead

The death took place in the
 Limerick County Infirmary on
 Monday of Mr. Joe Leahy, Cre-
 gane, Charleville, a member of
 a County Limerick family that
 made history in Irish athletics in
 the early years of the present
 century.

In the hurdle events, the pole
 jump, long jump and high jump
 the Leahy brothers were outstand-
 ing athletes. The other deceased
 brothers of this athletic family are
 Paddy, Con, Jack, Tim and Thomas
 A. Leahy, well-known Mallow auc-
 tioneer. They are survived by a
 brother, Michael, who resides in
 Mallow, and two sisters, in Charle-
 ville.

The late Joe Leahy, who oc-
 cupied the family homestead at
 Cregane, was the proud possessor
 of many medals and cups won by
 himself and his distinguished
 brothers at sporting events both at
 home and abroad. He was a mem-
 ber of the local athletic club dur-
 ing the period of its existence.

His death, at an advanced age,
 severs another link with the past
 generation in the athletic arena,
 and recalls the memory of the
 notable achievements of a family
 that will forever stand out pre-
 dominant in the history of Irish
 athletics. He was, like all the
 other members of the family, truly
 patriotic, sincere, straightforward
 and independent.

The remains were removed to
 Colmanswell Church on Monday
 evening and the funeral took place
 to the adjoining cemetery on Tues-
 day, after Requiem Mass.
