City honours its Olympic gold

JUST weeks before he hands over the chains of office to his successor, Mayor Diarmuid Scully ended a 100 year wait for a public monument to the only Limerick man to ever win an Olympic Gold Medal.

SOME months ago the mayor, who also revived an ancient Limerick tradition of casting a silver dart into the Shannon to honour every Mayor of Limerick's figurative role as admiral of the Shannon, announced that a memorial to Con Leahy of Cregane, County Limerick will be unveiled in Bedford Row on Saturday, June 3.

Con Leahy made history in 1906 when, after he won gold in the high jump in that year's Olympic Games in Athens, he refused to accept his medal while the British national anthem, God Save the Queen was being played. Con, with two other Irish medal winners did a victory lap of the stadium proudly holding aloft his Irish Tricolour to the rapturous applause of the crowd.

Leahy's fame for winning the Olympic Gold Medal was further enhanced for being the sportsman who brought the cause of Irish independence to a worldwide stage.

"The manner in which Con won that gold medal was historically significant because he brought the cause of Irish independence to an international audience," said the mayor

On Saturday, June 3, 100 years after his Olympic triumph it was Limerick's turn to publicly honour the great sportsman. A large number of his relatives and descendants had travelled to Limerick from as far away as the United States to be present at the unveiling by the mayor of the

The Leahy family of seven brothers and three sisters were brought up on a small farm, Cregane, on the Limerick/Cork county border.

They competed in regional and local events, national, international and Olympic events from 1897 though to 1913. During their time in athletic competition they won five Olympic medals, 33 Irish Championships, six British Titles and three American Championships. They were renowned as high jumpers in Athletic history.

Mr Murphy said the brothers were "modest in their success as they were sportsmanlike in their competitions and were also immensely helpful to the fledgling GAA in getting events off the ground.

"Their influence in being able to attract athletes at the highest competitive levels and their own participation

in sports events always guaranteed a highly successful sporting occasion."

He said that were it not for the interest of such writers and journalists as An Mangaire Sugach, Sean Murphy Seamus
