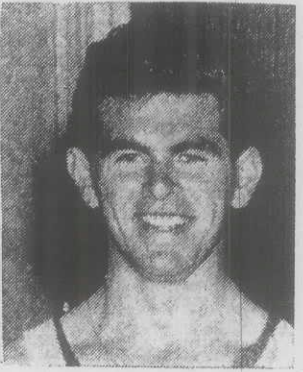
McGarry signs for Limerick soccer team

Limerick Soccer Club dropped a bombshell when they announced last night that they signed former hurling star, Tom McGarry, who is now the third player on the club's books for next season.

Last month, the famed, Treaty-Sarsfield, Limerick, Munster and Rest of Ireland hurling star turned out for his Shannon Airport employers, Progress International, in an inter-firm league, and his suspension by the Limerick County Board, for an alleged breach of the foreign games rule, followed a week later.

Meanwhile, the quietly spoken six-footer had been hitting home goals with great regularity for his firm—he scored seven in three games—and his prowess attracted the attention of Limerick player-coach Ewan Fenton.

FENTON IMPRESSED.
Fenton watched Tom in action and was so impressed that he asked him to sign immediately. McGarry,

having considered the matter, signed as an amateur last night.

A regular member of the Limerick and Munster teams for the last six years, McGarry has also been honoured by the Rest of Ireland selectors.

At handball, Tom, parenetered by Martin Mullins, had the unique distinction of winning three All-Ireland titles (minor, junior and senior) in the same season without losing a game. He has won the Gael Linn tournament—the most difficult of all to win—twice and finished runners-up last year.

The other players to sign for Limerick are player-coach, Ewan Fenton, and deputy centre-half and full-back, Tony Bresnihan.
