## Court told accused jumped from window to evade gardai

A MAN described by gardai as a "key member of a crimi-nal gang" engaged in the city feud was Limerick Court accused of breaching a court order excluding from four estates in Southill.

Paul Crawford, 33, formerly of 567, O'Malley
Park, is accused of breaching the order secured by Limerick City

Mr Crawford was granted bail in relation to the alleged breach on August 3, but remanded in custody in relation to the alleged offences on July 22 and 30. This was

despite protestations from Mr Crawford's solicitor, Ted McCarthy, that the court already had knowledge of the

jumped out an upstairs window of a house in O'Malley Park in an attempt to evade gardai.

Mr Crawford was remanded on bail in relation to the alleged offence on August 3 but the contral already had knowledge of the won new charges for the earlier dates.

"This matter has already been thrashed out by the State when it was brought to the attention of the court on the court of the c tion of the court on August 4," Mr McCarthy said, asking that the bail terms for the alleged offence on August 3 be extended to the two new charges

But Judge Malone said he was not prepared to take that course of action and remanded Mr Crawford in custody to August 15.

During the Council's application for an exclusion order on July 12,

senior gardai gave evi-dence that they believed Mr Crawford was a member of a criminal gang engaged in the control and supply of drugs for

many years.

Det Sgt Denis Treacy said this gang were involved in a feud in which six people had lost their lives in an 18 month.

which six people had lost their lives in an 18-month period up last April.
Supt Frank O'Brien told Judge Tom O'Donnell that Mr Crawford's family and the greater community in Southill had "suffered due to the presence of Paul Crawford" in Southill, and the application to exclude Mr application to exclude Mr Crawford from the estates was "absolutely necessary" to ensure the safety of the Crawford

The court heard that Noel Crawford, a brother of the accused, was shot dead in O'Malley Park last December 18 as he was celebrating his 40th birthday, but gardai believed Paul Crawford was the intended target as his brother was not involved in any feud-related activities.

Opposing the Council's application, McCarthy pointed out that Mr Crawford was never convicted of offences related to drugs or firearms, which was accepted by gardai.

Judge O'Donnell made

an order excluding Mr Crawford from O'Malley Park, Keyes Park, Kinco-ra Park and Carew Park

One of Ireland's first independent schools for autistic children, the Bluebell ABA School employs professionallytrained tutors to help autistic children improve their lives. Focusing on applied behaviour analysis, the school came to fruition as a result of a parent's initiative supported by the full backing of Dóchas (Hope for People with Autism)

The launch of the school took place in the Dóchas centre in Limer ick, and now the teachers have invited Paul to visit the school.

"He launched the school in the Dochas office in 2004, and we also met him out in UL for the Limerick Mini-Marathon in 2005, so it would be nice for him to visit the school. We are delighted that he has chosen us as his charity for such a high profile event," said Ms Bourke, whose son, Patrick, 8, is a student at the school.
