The name O'Donoghue has been synonymous with Mungret hurling and our player this week is of a trio of brothers of that name who are carrying on the tradition. He is 17-year-old Liam O'Donoghue, whose father, Joseph, was a member of the great Mungret teams of the '40's and won several trophies including a coveted Leader Cup award.

Liam, a student at Sexton St. C.B.S., plays hurling and football with his school and club, but it is as a hurler that he has really made his mark.

He is a real "will o' the wisp" forward, always on the watch for the loose ball, and deadly accurate when in possession. The feats of Jimmy Smith (Clare) scoring 6-4 in a Munster championship game or Nicky Rackard (Wexford) notching 7-7 in an All-Ireland semi-final are often recalled and are in fact records in their own right. But I am O'Donoghue's tally of 6-5 against St. Mary's in the 1968 County Juvenile Hurling Championship semi-final is comparable to both and is a Limerick Championship record for the under-age grades.

Liam has won many trophies including a 1964 schools hurling medal, minor football league (1965), Munster Colleges under 15½ H. in 1966, City Juvenile hurling championship (1968) and a City minor hurling league (1969).

His two brothers, Ger and Josie, are also prominent in Gaelic games, Ger is at present as tu.C.D. and plays hurling with the college side. He figured at centre-forward on the Sexton St. C.B.S. side which won the Harty Cup in 1866 and went on to win the All-Ireland Golleges Hurling Championship.

Josie wor a Munster Colleges under 151 medal in 1965 and a Dean Ryan Cup J.H. award in 1967 plus a City Minor Football League 1965 and several junior tournament prizes during 1967-68. He is now a regular member of the Mungret junior hurling and football teams.

Liam thinks that the present Mungret minor hurling team composed of last year's lavenile string will make a bold bid for this year's city championship.
