LIMERICK man Ger O'Rourke, became the became the first Irish winner of the Rolex Fastnet Yacht Race last week, is to be honoured by Limerick County Council next month.

He was accompanied on the mammoth 608-mile race by his 18-year-old daughter Deirdre, who has been following in her father's footsteps since the age of eight.
