Furious Ryan 'laces' into Loughnane's autobiography

TOM Ryan has labelled Ger Loughnane's infamous autobiography, Raising The Banner, 'a disgrace'

The man that led Limerick to Croke Park finals in 1994 and 96 said that the top selling book sunk

to a new low.

He has called for an investigation into comments made by Loughnane regarding Limerick corner back Steve McDonagh.

"The thing should be revisited in view of his comments about having contemplated flattening Stephen McDonogh in the

Stepnen McDollogh in the tunnel coming out onto the pitch, in the 1995 Munster final".

According to Ryan, that was a declaration of intent.

"Those tactics have to be explained and when I see them in print it gives a chill up my spine. A contemplated exercise of thuggery, it is psychological anyway and I would be worried about people in that frame of mind as to the way they would send out a team. To think you had to contend with that kind of attitude and mentalized. kind of attitude and men-tality in the opposing dressing room leaves me

angry."

He now believes that the Clare frame of mind in their '95 meeting was to win at all costs.

"I think is of paramount importance that we ensure that the game of hurling never has to put up with such people again. I would be worried about Loughnane in charge of an inter county





Also in the book Loughnane stated that Tom Ryan and Eamon Cregan, along with Jimmy Barry Murphy, were the only managers not to visit the


