## New Cathedral Organ A Worthy Instrument

The newly reconstructed organ in  
St. John's Cathedral will be blessed  
by the Lord Bishop, Most Rev. Dr.  
Murphy, to-morrow evening at  
7.30 p.m., following which there will  
be a recital on the instrument by  
Michael Van Dessel, of St. Peter's,  
Dundalk, and a choral recital by  
the Select Choir from St. Patrick's  
College, Maynooth.

With the completion of the work  
of re-building the organ in the Cath-  
edral, the Mother-church of the  
Diocese of Limerick can claim to  
possess one of the very finest and  
most modern instruments in these  
islands. It came originally from  
the hands of that great builder of  
organs, Dr. Hill, and has now been  
re-fashioned, with infinite care, and  
mostly by Irish craftsmen, under  
the guiding hand of Mr. Henry  
Willis, grandson of 'Father' Willis,  
so named because of his pre-eminent  
position amongst organ-builders.

It is in every sense a noble in-  
strument—in the quality of its ma-  
terials and workmanship, in the  
variety and beauty and magnificence  
of its tonal effects, in the order  
of its design and in the fantastic  
ease with which the artist can  
employ such a huge palette as this  
mighty organ affords him. It is,  
in fact, a fitting organ, indeed, to  
accompany and grace the Sacred  
Ceremonies in this glorious Cath-  
edral of St. John.

In its directives concerning the  
use of the instrument the Church  
never speaks of the organ, but  
always of the organs; and it orders  
that the organs be struck—a usage  
dating back to the time when each  
key was the width of a man's fist  
and had to be hit hard. In this re-  
built organ things are much differ-  
ent, for the drop of a finger is all  
that is now needed to produce either  
the softest or the loudest effects.  
What is more, tiny switches at the  
organist's hand, which light when  
they are touched, give a compelling  
visual guide to the actual position  
of the various internal controls,  
and pistons (thumb-switches) un-  
derneath the keyboards enable the  
organist to change tone-colours  
without raising his hands from the  
keys. And, in case even his  
thumbs should be too busy, there  
are foot-pistons which he can use  
for the same purpose.

Further this great organ can  
justly be referred to as the organs,  
for it is really not one organ but  
four. Over the stop-keys on the  
console, at which the performer  
plays, are the names, Swell, Great,  
Positive and Pedal. Each tab indi-  
cates a separate organ which has  
its own sound effects and controls.  
All are capable of being combined  
at the performer's will (but each  
has its own distinctive character).  
It should be emphasised that the  
primary purpose and design of all  
is the accompaniment of the sin-  
gular at the liturgical offices. All  
four will be heard during this open-  
ing recital.

The mechanism of the organ  
abounds in the most intriguing de-  
vices, many of them the product of  
centuries of research. Many others  
are the brain-children of this elec-  
trical age. They are united in  
this massive instrument to control  
its 2,588 pipes and to give to St.  
John's Cathedral a twentieth cen-  
tury organ of which the people of  
the diocese can be honestly proud.
