CORPORATION COMMITTEES.—A meeting of the Artizans Dwellings Committee was held in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, this afternoon, Alderman David Landera in the chair. The others present were—Town Councillors Donnelly, Kenna, Anglim, and McNainara. Mr Corbett, CE, Executive Sanitary Officer, and Mr A C Wallace, Town Clerk, were also in attendance. Mr Corbett announced that nine of the artizans cottages had been completed, and that the rent of the five in front should be 3s 6d a week, and the four at the rear 3s a week. This was agreed to. There were 42 applications to rent the five cottages in the front, and on a poll being taken five parties were selected as tenants. After some discussion it was resolved that they should give security for the rent, and enter into an agree- ment to keep the premises in proper condition. A meeting of the members of No 2 Committee was held subsequently, but no important business was transacted.

DEATH OF THE REV JAMES SULLIVAN.—We regret to announce the death of the Rev James Sullivan, formerly rector of Askeaton, in this county. Mr Sullivan, on his resignation of Askeaton parish, owing to his advancing years, went with two of his daughters to live at St Albans, in Hertfordshire. For some time past he had been in failing health, and on Sunday, July the 22nd, he entered into rest. The funeral took place on Thursday, July 22nd, at the ancient church of St Peter, at St Albans. The service was said by the Rev Ponsonby Sullivan, only son of the deceased.
