BIRTHS, MARRIAGES, CIREATHS PROPOSED FISHERY LEGISLATION.

At the Fishery Board to-day, Mr. Bloods Smyth submitted draft of a latter to be same to the Unief Secretary, giving him at his request certain information respecting Fishery Legislation. The Board recognized the fact that if a Bill dealing with the entire fishery laws were introduced it would be a highly contentions matter, but what they asked was merely that power should be conferred on the Inspectors of trial Fisherias to hold inquiring for the purpose. Irish Paheries to hold inquiries for the purpose of making changes in the seasons during which salmen or other fish might be caught. They considered such a Bill would not meet with opposition from any quarter. Reference was made to the large destruction of spawning fish in many tributaries of the Shannon in the mouth of October, because of the shallowness of the water, and to the fact that a market was open for the fish in that month. If that month were not open this destruction were not open this destruction would be averted. Again they were aware that large numbers of spring salmon in the pink of condition enter the Shannon in the month of January, when salmon were very valuable and wanted in the English markets. Yet the fishermen could not now fish for them. In connection with cels it was equally desirable that changes in the seasons should be made.

After some discussion, in which eference was made by Mr. Mackay and Mr. McIneraey, to the great loss to the fisheries by the destruction

of spawning fish, the letter was adopted.
Copies were ordered to be sent to the Department of Agriculture, the Fishmongers Associantion, London, and others.

DEATH OF MR. S. J. HURLEY.

He had been in failing health for some time rest. He tooks great interest in sport, failing in particular and up to a few years ago was a frequent contributor to the English sporting Press.
