## PROPOSED FISHERY LEGISLATION.

At the Fishery Board to-day, Mr. Blood-Smith submitted draft of a letter to be sent to the Chief Secretary, giving him at his request certain information respecting Fishery Legislation. The Board recognised the fact that if a Bill dealing with the entire fishery laws were introduced it would be a highly contentious matter, but what they asked was merely that power should be conferred on the Inspectors of Irish Fisheries to hold inquiries for the purpose of making changes in the seasons during which salmon or other fish might be caught. They considered such a Bill would not meet with opposition from any quarter. Reference was made to the large destruction of spawning fish in many tributaries of the Shannon in the month of October, because of the shallowness of the water, and to the fact that a market was open for the fish in that month. If that month were not open this destruction would be averted. Again they were aware that large numbers of spring salmon in the pink of condition enter the Shannon in the month of January, when salmon were very valuable and wanted in the English markets. Yet the fishermen could not now fish for them. In connection with eels it was equally desirable that changes in the seasons should be made.

After some discussion, in which reference was made by Mr. Mackay and Mr. McInerney, to the great loss to the fisheries by the destruction of spawning fish, the letter was adopted.

Copies were ordered to be sent to the Department of Agriculture, the Fishmongers Association, London, and others.

### DEATH OF MR. S. J. HURLEY.

Intelligence was received in town to-day of the death of an old and highly esteemed resident of Killaloe, Mr. S. J. Hurley, who passed away at an advanced age. He had been in failing health for some time past. He took great interest in sports, being in particular, and up to a few years ago was a frequent contributor to the English sporting Press. Mr. Hurley was at one time a member of the Fishery Board, and took a great interest in its proceedings.

### DEATH OF MRS. SYNAN.

We regret to record the death which occurred at her residence, 68 Northumberland Road, Dublin, to-day of Mrs. Adelaide Mary Synan, widow of the late Mr. John Synan, (formerly Clerk of the Crown and Peace for Limerick), and sister-in-law of Mr. E. J. Synan, M.P., who in the early eighties was one of the county representatives in Parliament. Funeral on Saturday morning at ten o'clock, from St. Michael's R.C. Church, for Mount St. Lawrence.

### FISHERY BOARD.

At an adjourned meeting of the Fishery Board to-day, it was decided to call a meeting of all Fishery proprietors and others interested for the 3th December to consider the offer of the Department of Agriculture to give £3 to every £1 subscribed to a fund of £200 for the protection of the fisheries.
