**MORTALITY STATISTICS.**—The average annual death-rate represented by the deaths registered last week in the sixteen principal Town Districts of Ireland was 33·5 per 1,000 of the population. The deaths registered in the past week in the several towns, alphabetically arranged, corresponded to the following annual rates per 1,000:—  
 Armagh, 31·0; Belfast, 42·0; Cork, 28·6; Drogheda, 63·4; Dublin, 30·1; Dundalk, 13·1; Galway, 20·2; Kilkenny, 76·1; Limerick, 27·0; Lisburn, 19·3; Londonderry, 23·2; Lurgan, 20·5; Newry, 24·6; Sligo, 43·3; Waterford, 34·7; Wexford, 38·5.  
 The deaths from the principal zymotic diseases in the 16 districts were equal to an annual rate of 3·7 per 1,000, the rates varying from 0·0 in five of the districts to 8·3 in Belfast, the 183 deaths from all causes registered in that district comprising 18 from measles (being 7 over the number from that disease in the preceding week), 13 from whooping-cough (an increase of 8 as compared with the number in the preceding week), 2 from diphtheria, 1 from enteric fever, and 2 from diarrhoea. Among the 44 deaths from all causes registered in Cork are 3 from measles.

**DEATH OF MR W U TOWNSEND**—We regret to learn of the death of Mr William Uniacke Townsend at 15, Earlsfort Terrace, Dublin, on Saturday last at the comparatively early age of 63 years. Mr Townsend was long connected with this county, and resided at Spahill, near Kilmine, up to a period of about seven years ago, when he changed his residence to Dublin. Mr Townsend was an extensive land agent, and occupied several positions in connection with the Irish Church. He was one of the Diocesan Trustees and a member of the General Synod. It was only a few days ago since he resigned the last-mentioned position, as he considered himself unable on account of his health to attend. Mr Townsend's conduct was always marked by strict rectitude and uprightness. He was an able administrator, and his loss will be severely felt by a very large circle. In the re-arrangement of the financial matters connected with the diocese of Limerick, rendered necessary by the disestablishment of the Irish Church, Mr Townsend took a deep interest. He spared neither time, thought, nor labour in his efforts to place the arrangements of the diocese on a sound financial basis. On his departure from Limerick the Diocesan Council expressed their sense of the loss they had sustained in being deprived of his advice and assistance. The services which he rendered the Church at that great crisis and ever since deserve the warmest thanks of all its members.
