

Resolutions continue to pour in SUPPORT GROWS

University project gathers greater momentum

RESOLUTIONS from public bodies, committees and other interested parties continue to pour into the Government and the Commission supporting Limerick's claim to a university.

The support has not come alone from local people but from many parts of Munster and feeling has grown stronger in favour of the project. The Project Committee have done wonderful work and have put up a magnificent case to the Commission.

Every public body and committee in North Tipperary, Kerry and Clare have passed resolutions supporting the project and these bodies consider a university as far as Limerick is concerned is vital. The latest support comes from Dublin where at a meeting of the Limerickmen's Association, Thomas L. O'Halloran, President, stated that the Project Committee had stated their case very well and put their points most effectively.

The committee congratulated the pioneers of the project but expressed the hope that the Commission did not fully realise or fully appreciate the imaginative permeability of those pioneers. What the Committee may consider imaginative to-day, would come very real in the near future, he said.

Capt. O'Gorman-Quinn also spoke very strongly in favour of a university for Limerick and said that it was deserving every support and pointed out the pre-eminence of Limerick in years in educational matters. Meanwhile the Committee continues with their task and attempts to distort the picture as far as the project is concerned is being watched carefully and all criticisms are met on the spot. The ordinary man in the street has become university-minded and now more than ever appreciates the vital role colleges can play in the future of Limerick in all spheres of activity.

Cyclist died from fracture of skull

At an inquest in Dromcollogher, on Tuesday evening, a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence that deceased died from shock and brain injury, from a compound fracture of the skull as a result of being accidentally struck by a motor car, was returned.

The inquest was into the death of Patrick Feahey (47), an unmarried farm labourer, of Woodfield, Dromcollogher, Co. Limerick, who died almost immediately after being involved in a collision with a motor car while cycling near his home village on Monday night.

The accident occurred about 6 o'clock while deceased was heading homewards after he had milked some cows for a farmer. The driver of the car was Garda Patrick McAuliffe, Dromad, Co. Louth, was stated to be a native of Newcastle West. Evidence of identification was given by Thomas Feahey, brother of deceased. He said his brother was in perfect health when he last saw him alive at 3.15 on Monday afternoon.

CUBAN STORY IS TOLD AT SHANNON

MR. HAROLD DERBER, of Manchester, who was deported by the American authorities for allegedly ferrying Cubans to Florida, told his story when he landed at Shannon Airport.

It all began back in Key West, Florida, where he was arrested aboard his boat and escorted into port, he said, by three destroyers, a weather ship and a coast-guard vessel.

"The crew of five and myself were refused permission to speak to anyone and we were interrogated for three hours and then taken on a seven-mile journey to Tampa, Florida. Finally, after three days, my attorney was permitted to speak to me on the telephone. A number of charges were made and I was taken to Dade County Jail."

STILL HELD
He said the crew included three British, including himself, one Dominican and an American girl. Their 60 ft. boat was still being held by the U.S. authorities.

Derber, who said he was a former member of the British Fleet Auxiliary Service as a radio and navigating officer, said he made the ferry crossing to Key West with 23 Cubans.

"It is my intention to go back and fight the American authorities to get my boat back and to start again where I left off, for I have a licence from the Cuban Government to take passengers from Cuba to America."

He said they all had visas from the American authorities, but he added, "by some hypocrisy" the Americans would not permit them to land.

"NO GREAT VALUE"
Derber said that the Cuban Government permitted those people to leave as they consider they are of no great value to the country when they are so anxious to get out.

Derber intends to spend a few days in London before going to Manchester. His home was at Hartley Avenue, Prestwich, before he went to the United States four and a half years ago. His aircraft, with 78 people aboard, was diverted to Shannon

COMPLAINED OF COLD

While Derber was at Shannon Airport he was escorted all the time by a B.O.A.C. steward. He had been kept on board the aircraft but complained that it was cold. At that time there was heavy frost at Shannon Airport. Then he was given breakfast in Shannon and taken back on board the aircraft again.

Derber last night arrived at London Airport. He will stay with his brother in Willesden before going to Manchester to see his parents. He said most of the £130,000 he claims the incident cost him, went on attorney's fees.

Three men charged at Special Court
