# University Must Come — Eventually

'Inadvisable now,' says Professor

"YOU cannot get a university by fiat. A university must develop from the express needs of the population and the availability of personnel to staff it as well as equipment," said Professor John McKenna, M.A., Ed.B., Ph.D., F.B.P.S. in an exclusive interview with the "Limerick Leader" to-day.

Professor McKenna was lecturing throughout the week to 250 school teachers at the I.N.T.O. Summer Course in the School of Commerce, which concluded to-day.

Professor McKenna, who has had a distinguished career as an educationalist and psychologist, stated that he thought it was possible to have a university in Limerick if the facilities existed for it, but suggested that it should materialise as a college of technology. "I would like to say that it might be better if the university was allowed to develop from a college of higher technology where the behaviour pattern would be taught," said Professor McKenna.

### INADVISABLE

He pointed out that some time ago it was stated that Ireland was overstaffed as far as university education was concerned, but now it was being realised that institutes of higher education were essential to a progressive democracy and the more we had of university education the better life would be enjoyed by all.

Professor McKenna added: "You cannot divorce the needs of the community from any plan for expansion, but at the present moment a university in Limerick would be inadvisable without the considered needs of the West of Ireland within the next ten years. Economists should be consulted in order to gain an overall picture of the needs of the community."

"I judge that the solution to many social problems depends on our social structure and level of technology and that the most important limiting factor is often the misuse of money, but often the allocation of money depends on the concentration of the problem by a well informed pressure group who can form opinions, create public and attitudes in the public at large," he concluded.

This is the first time a Bishop has been consecrated in the Limerick Priory and the concelebration will probably be performed by the Apostolic Delegate in Lagos. On Monday, Rev. T. Condon, O.S.A., will celebrate the Golden Jubilee of his ordination, while Very Rev. Mgr. T. Cotter, Bishop-Elect of Maiduguri, Nigeria; Rev. Fr. N. C. Power and Rev. C. Pizzani will celebrate the Silver Jubilee of their ordinations.

### ABBEYSFEALE

Mgr. Cotter, a native of Abbeysfeale, was ordained in Rome in 1941 and completed his studies in 1942. He was appointed to Nigeria in 1943, where he has been ever since. He worked with Bishop Dalton in Adamawa Province and was appointed Prefect Apostolic of Maiduguri in 1952.

Rev. T. Condon, who celebrates the 50th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood, was for many years Education Supervisor in 24th in the diocese of Maiduguri, and is now parish priest of Buzza in Maiduguri. Rev. C. Pizzani, of Athony, went to Nigeria after his ordination. He was then transferred

to Australia, from where he returned four years ago. After spending a period in Hoxton in London, Limerick and is now a member of the Limerick community. Fr. N. C. Power was born in Eddin, Kilmallock, Co. Limerick, and was stationed in Dungarvan for six years. He is a brother of Rev. J. Power, O.S.A., who is in the United States, and of Rev. K. Power, S.J. He has three sisters nuns.

## Hopes raised in paper strike

Hopes have risen that the 18-week-old strike by 1,500 workers employed at three paper mills throughout the country will end this week-end. The firms involved are the Glendalough Paper Mills and the Kiltinan Paper Mills in Dublin, and the National Board and Paper Mills in Waterford.

On Thursday, the findings of the Labour Court, which favoured private inlets, were sent out to the Unions and the Federated Union of Employers. It is hoped that the findings will be accepted by the workers.

The workers met on Friday to discuss the new proposals and to arrange for the ballots. The ballots may be taken during the week-end and the result may be known on Monday.

The workers are claiming increased pay and differentiation, but, up to now, the management have been insisting on the introduction of a four-shift working system.

The Unions involved include the I.C.T.U., which has the majority of the workers, the Workers' Union of Ireland, the Automobile Drivers and Mechanics' Union, and the United Stationary Engine Drivers' Union.

## Thousands of working days lost in 1965

Figures published by the research department of the I.C.T.U. show that more than half a million working days were lost through 89 strikes and lock-outs last year, but mainly through three big stoppages.
