SMOKIN' JOE WALKS OUT

SSMOKIN' Joe Frazier, the world heavyweight box-
ing champion, refused to go on stage for his
scheduled appearance at the City Theatre on Saturday
night—and the 40-odd people in the theatre who had
waited 45 minutes were told by Mr. Jack Bourke,
Manager, City Theatre, that Frazier had disappeared
and refused to appear because of the small attend-
ance.

Frazier and his promoters
went away in a Rolls Royce to
Tralee . . . and the handful of
people who paid £1.50 and £1.25
to see him were left sitting in
the theatre not knowing what
was taking place back stage.
Even manager, Jack Bourke,
was stunned to hear when he
went back stage that Frazier
and his company had already
disappeared.

"I can only apologize for what
has happened. Joe Frazier has
refused to go on stage because
of the small attendance. The

money will be refunded to you.
I do not know if I will be paid
for the use of the hall," he said.

Mr. Bourke said that Joe
Frazier and his all-star show
company were due to be greeted
by the Mayor, Cllr. J. P. Liddy,
earlier in the day, but they did
not turn up until three hours
later, and even a Press confer-
ence, due to be held at 7 p.m.,
could not take place because of
their late arrival.

After Mr. Bourke revealed the
disappointing news angry pat-
