They were given a civic reception at the City Library by the Mayor, Councillor J. P. Liddy.

The spacemen had a very special welcome for fifteen years old Brian English, a student at St. Munchin's College, who this year was the best boy in the Aer Lingus-sponsored Young Scientist of the Year competition.

And when that difficulty was resolved by the substitution of Astrohaut Swigert, we presumed that the remainder of the programme would go as planned.

"Tew of us, indeed, will ever forget the tense drama in which we became personally involved, as we followed your fight for survival through all its stages, on our television screens.

"All the destructive forces of nature combined to create anightmare situation to which no human beings had ever before been exposed.

"While we must pay the highest ribute to the American technologists and scientists at Houston and other stations, who strove against overwhelming odds to bring the crippled space alip back to earth, their best efforts would have been in vain but for the courage, resourcefulness and steadfastness of spirit which the three of you displayed.

"For one brief spell, men and women of every race, colour and creed across the face of the earth, were united in spirit as they watched, waited and prayed for your safe return.

"And the expressions of joy and relief at Mission Control when Odyssey eventually splashed down in the Pacific were echoed a million-fold here in Ireland.
