

INING AND DEVELOPMENT ACT 2000 ENDED BY ARTICLE 17 OF THE PLANNING ND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS 200

n accordance with Article 81 of the Planning and Development Regulations 2001 as amended by Article 17 of the Planning and Development Regulations 2006, Limerick City Council intends to carry out the following works:

Provision of a new entrance and associated works at the Peoples Park, at the junction of Upper Mallow Street and Boherbuoy, Limerick.

The development will consist of:

The recessing of the existing boundary railings to create a new curved entrance area to the Park, with a seating area to the front. The existing railings will be re-set in new curved limestone kerbs (to match existing kerbs) and new cut limestone gate piers and new cast iron gates are to be erected. The entrance will be paved, to match the existing paving, at the main entrance at the northwest

The site of the proposed development is located within the curtilage of a protected structure, i.e., the Spring Rice Memorial (RPS 038).

An architectural heritage impact assessment report has been prepared.

Plans and particulars of the proposed development will be available for inspection, or purchase at a fee not exceeding €20, at Limerick City Council's Planning & Development Department, 1st Floor, City Hall, Merchants Quay, Limerick (Tel. 061 407210), between the hours of 10.00 a.m. and 4.00 p.m., Monday to Friday for a period of 6 weeks beginning on Monday 28th May,

im seeks help with book on grandfather

THE author of a new book chronicling the life of a soldier in Limerick during the War of Independence and the Irish Civil War is seek ing the help of the pubic in compiling the

Jim Corbett, originally from Farranshone and now living in Surrey, is penning a book about the life of his grandfather, Cornelius McNamara from Thomondgate, who was a captain in A Compa-ny, 2nd Battalion, Mid-Limerick Brigade, and also the officer commanding the Strand Barracks during the siege in July 1922. Mr McNamara fought on the side of the Irish Republican Army

against the National Army of the Irish Free State

"I am writing a book about his life in Limerick, and especially his time during the war of Independence and the Civil War. I would be interested in hearing from anyone who can identify the people in old pictures, or anyone who can give information about A Company," said Jim, who noved to England in

He began working on the book, Not While I Have Ammo, early last year because he had heard many stories about his grandfather, but, unfortunately, nev-

"It is the 50th anniversary of his reference to the response by Cornelius when the Irish Free Staters asked him to surrender the Strand Barracks. 'Not While I Have Ammo,' is what he is said to have replied to them," Jim

explained. One of several interesting escapades in the forthcoming book is a reference to an incident in which an Irish Free State trooper fired a bullet in the direc-tion of Cornelius. "He had a very lucky escape-the bullet hit his earpiece," said Jim.

As a memento of his luck escape, Cornelius retained the bullet and gave it to his wife, Sarah Donnelly from Galway, who kept it as a brooch. "The bullet is a family heirloom to this day," said Jim.

Ammo is due to be launched in Limerick on January 14 in the Hilton Hotel by a nephew of Cornelius, the chairman, of the board of management at HSI Limerick Business School

rescued

SIX German tourists were among eight people res cued by Lough Derg RNLI in two separate incidents ast Friday.

Shortly before 2pm, the lifeboat rescued six adults on board a 40ft cruiser that had run aground at Urra Point, near Dromineer in poor weather conditions, with six-foot swells caused by Force 9

The six people, all German tourists, were safe but shaken, and they were removed from the boar and brought to the lifeboat station at Dromi-

At 4.25pm, the lifeboat went to assist two people on board a speedboat that had suffered engine failure near Portumna. The vessel was towed to Portumna Harbour.
