# Monument to two IRA volunteers to be unveiled on Sunday

# Meelick Ambush is marked 90 years on

TWO IRA volunteers killed during a failed attack on a train a few miles outside the city 90 years ago are to be honoured at a ceremony in Meelick this weekend.

Clondrinagh man Michael Gleeson and Christopher McCarthy, from Miltown Malbay, were members of the Caherdavin company of the East Clare IRA brigade which had planned to intercept mail on the train which they believed could reveal the identity of a spy passing information to the British.

Both were gunned down by soldiers from the Royal Scots regiment on June 15, 1921, and their actions are to be remembered this weekend by a local committee which includes Tom Gleeson, a grandnephew of Michael Gleeson's; historians Tom Toomey and Padraig Og O Ruairc, Johnny White and Cllr Cathal Crowe.

The Meelick Ambush Commemoration Committee has, since February, raised around €4,000 for a memorial to the two men and their actions that day. Made by Raymond Kelly, Gerald Griffin Street, this will be unveiled by members of the Gleeson and McCarthy families by the railway bridge on Woodcock Hill Road in Meelick at around 1.30pm on Sunday. This will be preceded by mass in Meelick at 12 noon, with wreaths to be blessed by

Fr Tom Carroll. These will afterwards be laid at the Republican plot in the local churchyard.

Tom Toomey said of the ambush that from the IRA's point-of-view "everything that could have gone wrong, did go wrong". They had laid a stone barricade across the track less than a mile from the train station at Cratloe.

Tom Bentley, an IRA volunteer from Cratloe, had been detailed to board the Limerick-Ennis train and wave his cap out the window for the waiting IRA if there were any troops on board. Around 30 of the Royal Scots had got on in Limerick and Bentley issued his warning. The train driver ploughed through the barricade but the British, having spotted the IRA

in the fields, ordered him to reverse back down the line.

"The British soldiers opened fire with two machine guns as soon as they caught sight of the IRA men at the railway line," Padraig Og O Ruairc records

"As they attempted to retreat, Christopher McCarthy was wounded by the opening volley of machine gun fire and fell to the ground."

Gleeson had found cover but, in what Tom Toomey describes as "an act of heroism", emerged to help his fallen comrade. He, in turn, was shot in a hail of fire as he retreated up the field from the British troops advancing from the track.

Both men died of their wounds and were buried in the Republican plot in Meelick churchyard.
